Justin Neff, 33, County Road 299, Sweetwater was charged with child abuse and possession of schedule II oxycodone.

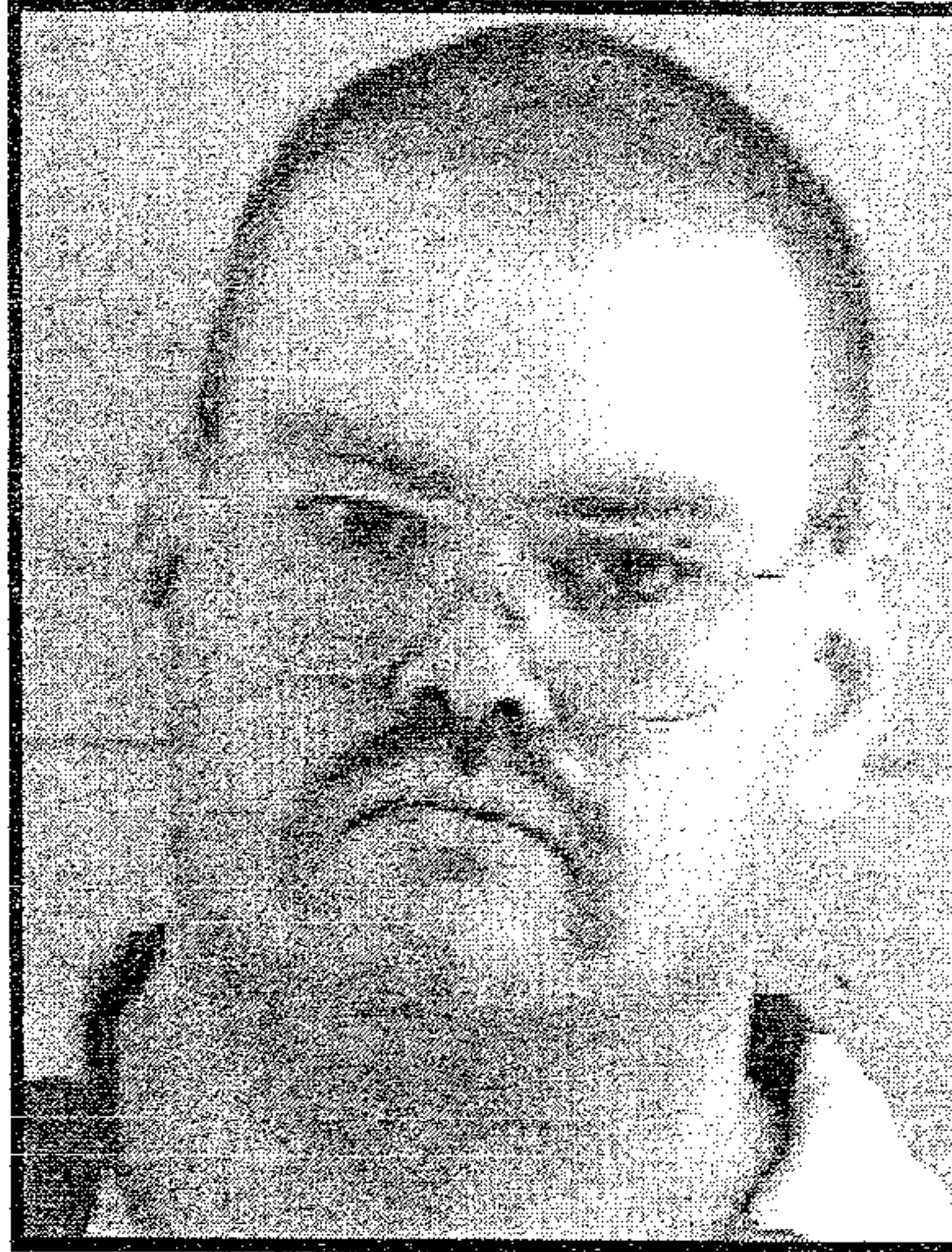
The report states, Corporal Pete McGinley, LCSO responded to an unwanted

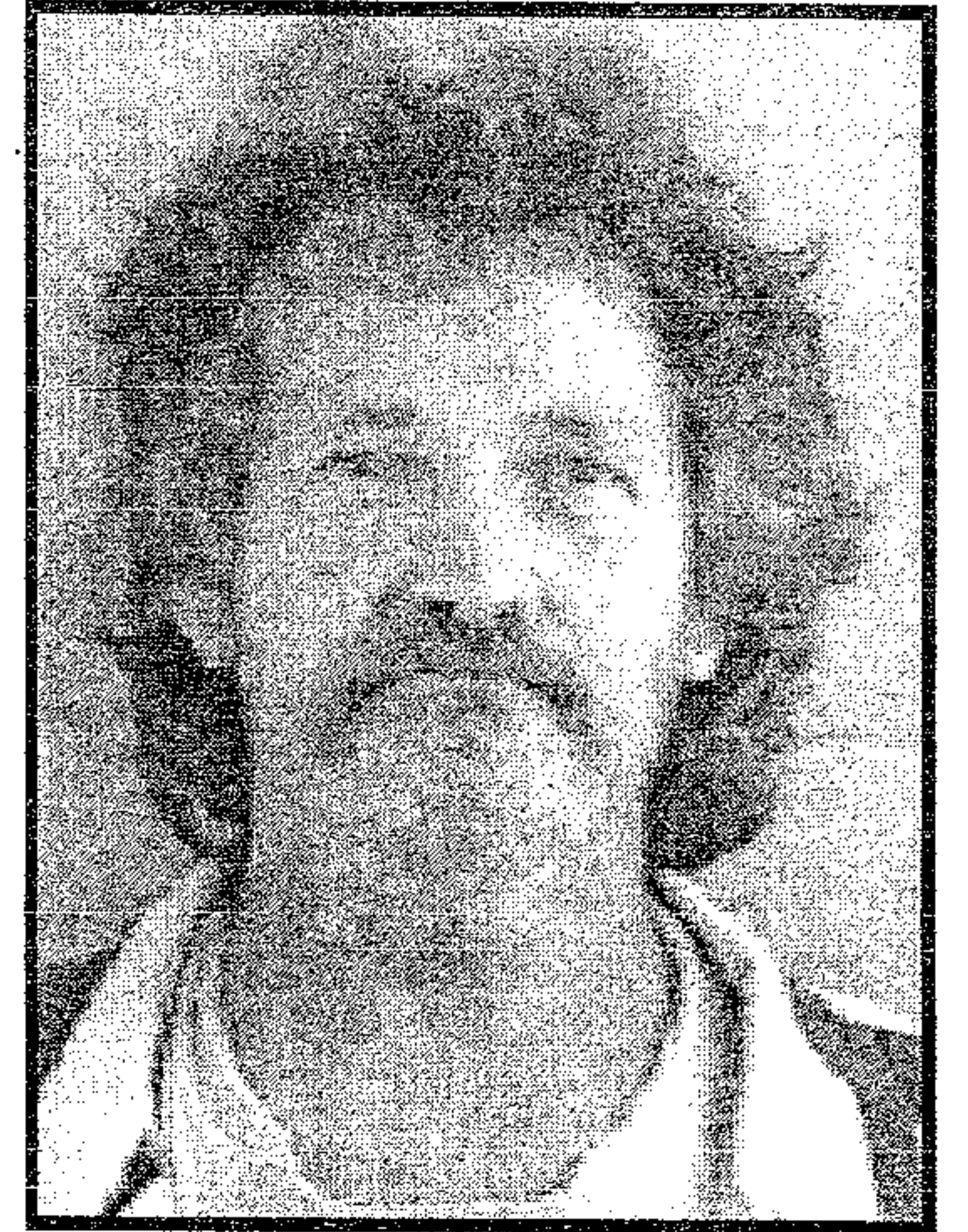

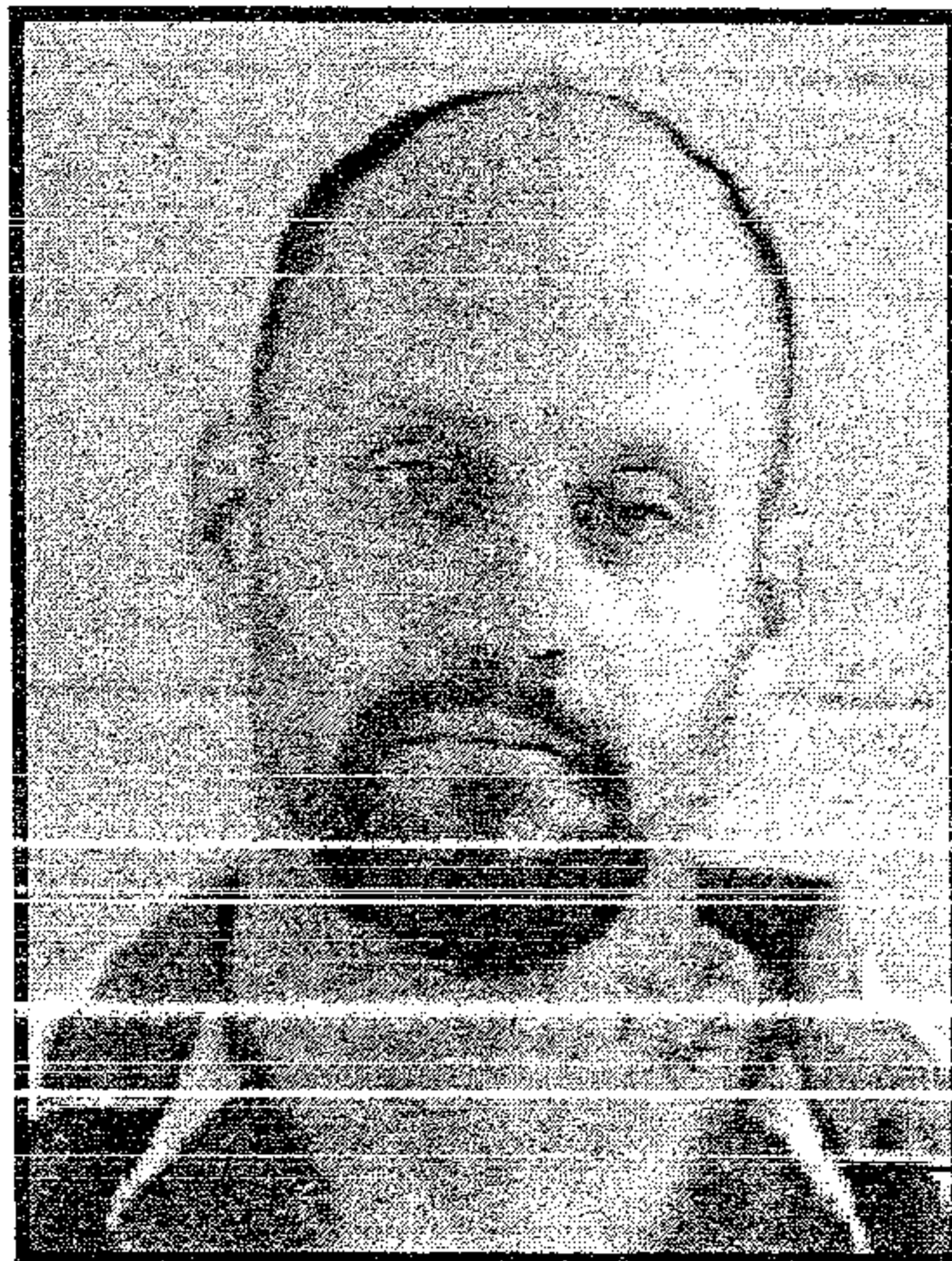
Passenger found with more than 250 pills for resale after drug deal

don't drink and drive. Our State Troopers are prepared to patrol and remove any and all drunk drivers from our roadways."

Nearly 5,000 people in the U.S. died in crashes during the Halloween time period from 1996-2005. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), in 2008, 58 percent of all highway fatalities across the nation on Halloween night involved a driver or motorcycle rider with a Blood Alcohol Concentration (BAC)

of .08 or higher.

Last year in Tennessee, two people were killed in two crashes on Halloween between midnight, October 31, 2009, through 6 a.m., November 1, 2009. Both of those crashes involved alcohol. That compares to seven people killed in six crashes on Halloween during the same time period in 2008. Four out of the six fatal crashes in 2008 involved alcohol.

"Our Halloween plea to everyone is to keep the party off the road," said THP Colonel Tracy Trott. "If you've been drinking, don't make the poor decision to get behind the wheel - it could cost someone their life, maybe even your own. So please be smart; it's not worth the risk."

Partygoers, parents and children alike have a responsibility to be safe this Halloween. Simple precautions for partygoers include designating a sober driver in advance or taking a taxi, while parental guard-

ians should closely watch children and teach them to obey safety rules.

Halloween is the most dangerous day of the year for pedestrian injuries and deaths among young children. The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) found that the number of deaths among young pedestrians (ages 5-14) is four times higher on Halloween evening than any other evening of the year. Thirty-eight percent of all young (under age 16) pedestrian fatalities occurred between 3 p.m. and 7 p.m., and alcohol involvement - either for the driver or pedestrian - was reported in 48 percent of traffic crashes that resulted in pedestrian fatalities.

The hunt will be for young sportsman ages 10-16 that have passed a TWRA Hunter Education class. schedule II oxycodone for resale.

According to reports, Investigator Shane Ezell, LCSO observed a green Saturn pull into the parking lot of a gas station on Highway 321 in Lenoir City. The Saturn pulled in front of a silver Dodge truck parked beside the building.

The passenger got out of the Saturn and walked to the driver side of the truck, spoke to the driver and made a hand to hand transaction. The truck

left the location traveling towards the interstate. The Saturn then left traveling towards Highway 11.

Investigator Ezell pulled out behind the Saturn and observed the driver on a cell phone. The vehicle crossed over the center line in heavy traffic but the driver jerked it back over into the correct lane. The lawman stopped it at City Park Drive and identified the driver as John T. Romines and his passenger as David Scott Wiseman.

A check through NCIC re-

vealed both Romines and Wiseman's drivers license's were suspended for failure to satisfy citations. They also had warrants out of other counties.

While Romines was being issued a warning citation for failure to maintain lanes, Deputy Michael Watkins, LCSO arrived on scene and he and his K9 partner Denero conducted a K9 sniff of the Saturn.

The deputy advised Investigator Ezell Denero alerted to the odor of narcotics inside the vehicle and during a search, two bottles of oxycodone were found in the passenger door. One bottle was marked to contain 240 thirty mg pills, but had 60 fifteen mg oxycodone and 118 thirty mg oxycodone. The other bottle

was marked to contain 90 fifteen mg oxycodone, but had instead 30 fifteen mg oxycodone, 58 thirty mg oxycodone and a clear cellophane containing 2 fifteen mg oxycodone. Both bottles of medication were prescribed and filled on October 21st, 2010.

Both men were arrested and transported to the Loudon County Jail.

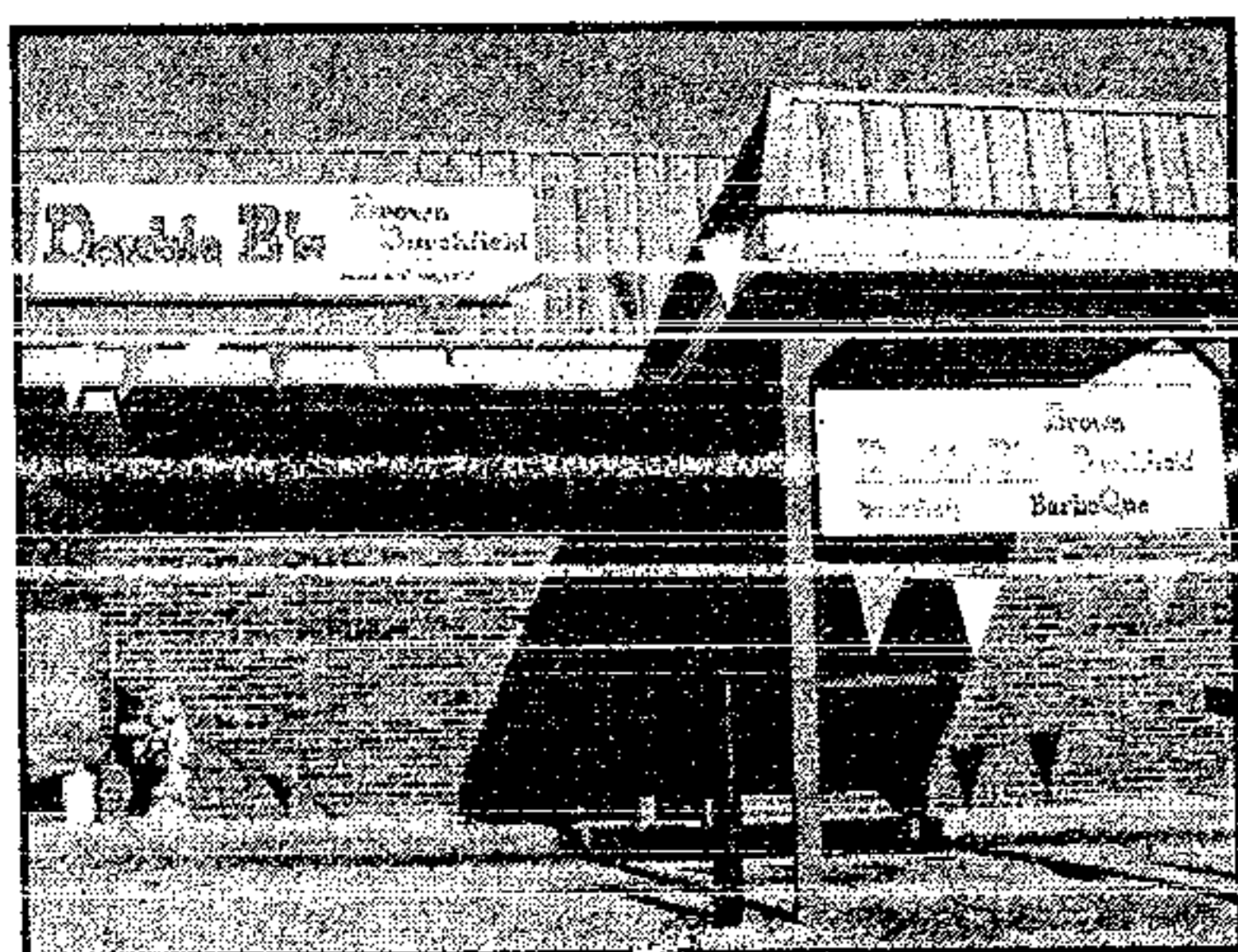
