

From trailer to hotel, LCSO-ND finds meth lab makings

Members of the Loudon County Sheriff's Office Narcotics Unit charged two persons with manufacturing methamphetamine after a local homeowner called to report the pair was making the deadly drug in his trailer and responding officials found evidence of the clandestine operation. Unit members confronted the pair a short time later at a local motel and reported finding more items used to manufacture meth in the room, vehicle and the woman's purse, which included a handwritten recipe for the drug.

kansas and Samantha Jean Wright, 33, Oakland Road, Philadelphia were charged with promotion of methamphetamine manufacture.

According to reports, at 11:39 PM, Thursday, the Loudon County Sheriff's Office received a call from a man stating Jason Neal and a female broke into his home on Duggan Road. The homeowner advised Neal and the female were making drugs in his trailer.

Sgt. Billy Hall, LCSO-ND arrived and was granted consent to search the house for a meth lab. According to Sgt. Hall's report, when he entered the trailer he saw several items used to manufacture meth, which included a plastic bottle

with tubing coming from the top, an unknown liquid, several containers of acid, a plastic bottle with an unknown liquid and solid, and a glass jar with a by-layer unknown liquid.

While Sgt. Hall and the homeowner were talking, several people arrived and said Jason Neal and Samantha Wright were seen at the trailer earlier.

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A short time later, Samantha Wright's vehicle was spotted at the Kings Inn in Lenoir City. Hall went to King's Inn and found Neal and Wright in room 144. He received consent to search Ms. Wright's vehicle and the hotel room.

Records indicate a search of Wright's vehicle produced two bottles of iodine, one which was mixed with peroxide, two boxes of pseudo ephedrine and a receipt for the purchase of one gallon of acid.

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While interviewing Wright and Neal, the pair admitted to being at the trailer during the day. Both advised the iodine and pseudo ephedrine found in the vehicle was going to be used to manufacture meth.

Wright further advised they left a gallon of acid at the trailer and that the homeowner gave them consent to be in his trailer.

Investigator Shane Ezell, LCSO-ND, was also on the scene.

The amount of the stolen merchandise was \$24.



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
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Purse

The FBI & UFOS

If you've ever watched The X-Files or other sci-fi shows like

it, you may think that investigating unexplained phenomena is one of the FBI's investigative responsibilities-right along with terrorism, espionage, white-collar crime, etc.

In fact, the FBI was only occasionally involved in investigating the possibility of UFOs and extraterrestrials over the years. The first Bureau investigations we are aware of began in the summer of 1947—the time of the now well-known incident in Roswell,

New Mexico. A rash of reports of flying objects—some shaped like "flapjacks," saucers, discs, and even a large circular saw blade that supposedly hit a lightning rod on top of a church started to surface and make headlines across the nation.

Concerned citizens reported many of these strange sightings to the FBI. That wasn't surprising, given that the Bureau had investigated airline crashes such as the Hindenburg disas-

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ter in 1937 and aerial dangers like the balloon bombs launched by Japan toward the U.S. Pacific Northwest near the end of World War II. The FBI's lead role in protecting the homeland during the war was also well known, and the Bureau remained front and center in ensuring national security as the Cold War began to unfold.

Initially, it was not clear how UFO sightings should be handled. FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover recognized that the Air Force—then part of the U.S. Armyclearly had the lead in such issues, but he did want his agents to investigate any "discs" recovered for their potential impact on FBI responsibilities.

The Army did want the FBI's help-at least at first. On July 30, 1947, the Bureau issued this notice to all of its offices:

(B) Flying Discs – The Bureau, at the request of the Army Air Forces Intelligence, has agreed to cooperate in the investigation of flying discs....You should investigate each instance which

is brought to your attention of a sighting of a flying disc in order to ascertain whether or not it is a bona fide sighting, an imaginary one or a prank. Three years later,

that policy changed. A July 1950 FBI statement said that "the jurisdiction and responsibility for investigating flying saucers have been assumed by the United States Air Force. Information received in this matter is immediately turned over to the Air Force, and the FBI does not attempt to investigate these reports or evaluate the information furnished."

From this point, the FBI's cases on UFOs dropped off dramatically. Neither the public nor the Air Force sought our expertise as they had during the first few years of the Cold War.

There were a few exceptions. In 1977, for example, the Air Force informed us of the end of their "Project Blue Book" investigation of UFO reports. And in 1988, we were asked to look into the release of what appeared to be a 1952 classified document concerning a UFO-related top secret government group called "Majestic 12"—we determined that the document was a fake.


