A total of \$43.94 worth of merchandise was recovered.





According to reports, Deputy Chad Petty, LCSO observed Martha J. Mills driving a a red Ford Taurus. The vehicle turned from Lakeview Road onto Martel Road. Deputy Petty had prior knowledge Ms. Mills' license are suspended.

The officer attempted to catch up with the Taurus when it turned into Martel Estates trying to avoid being stopped. At that time, the deputy noticed a older Chevy truck traveling on Martel Road. As he was turning into Martel Estates, the Taurus came out of Hidden Oaks, following the Chevy truck.

Upon searching the vehicle, a clear plastic baggie and a nap-kin were found with

small round green pills believed to be roxycodone.

Ms. Mills reportedly stated the pills were hers. A search of Ms. Mills produced a pink plastic straw believed used to snort the pills.

John Darren James, 39, Steekee Creek Road, Loudon was charged with criminal impersonation, failure to appear and theft under \$500.

Mr. James got the theft charge when he reoprtedly was observed by Walmart Security on March 10th, 2010, breking open a watch package and concealing the watch on his person. He was also observed acting in concert with Ms. Mills, putting items into Walmart shopping bags. After putting the merchandise in the bags he (they) passed all points of sale and the final point of sale.

As James was approached by Security, he fled the property and was not appre-

hended at that time, but upon her arrest Ms. Martha June Mills gave James's name as her accomplice. Restitution or \$5 for the watch is being sought. The watch was never recovered.





Temorial Day

rate the sacrifices of Jivil War soldiers, by Proclamation of Genaral John A. Logan of the Grand Army of the Republic, an organization of former sailors and soldiers. On May 5, 1868, Logan declared in General Order No. 11 that:

The 30th of May, 1868, is designated for the purpose of strewing with flowers, or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during the late rebellion, and whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village, and hamlet churchyard in the land. In this

observance no form of ceremony is prescribed, but posts and comrades will in their own way arrange such fitting services and testimonials of respect as circumstances may permit.

During the first celebration of Decoration Day, General James Garfield made a speech at Arlington National Cemetery, after which 5,000 participants helped to decorate the graves of the more than 20,000 Union and Confederate soldiers buried in the cemetery.

This 1868 celebration was inspired by local observances of the day in several towns throughout America that had taken place in the three years since the Civil War. In fact, several Northern and Southern cities claim to be the birthplace of Memorial Day, including Columbus, Miss.; Macon, Ga.; Richmond, Va.; Boalsburg, Pa.; and Carbondale, III.

In 1966, the federal government, under the direction of President Lyndon Johnson, declared Waterloo, N.Y., the official birthplace of Memorial Day. They chose Waterloo—which had first celebrated the day on May 5, 1866—because the town had

made Memorial Day an annual, community-wide event during which businesses closed and residents decorated the graves of soldiers with flowers and flags.

By the late 1800s, many communities across the country had begun to celebrate Memorial Day and, after World War I, observances also began to honor those who had died in all of America's wars. In 1971, Congress declared Memorial Day a national holiday to be celebrated the last Monday in May. (Veterans Day, a day set aside to honor all veterans, living and dead, is celebrated

each year on November 11.)

Today, Memorial Day is celebrated at Arlington National Cemetery with a ceremony in which a small American flag is placed on each grave. Also, it is customary for the president or vice-president to give a speech honoring the contributions of the dead and lay a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. About 5,000 people attend the ceremony annually.

Several Southern states continue to set aside a special day for honoring the Confederate dead, which is usually called Confederate Memorial Day.
