

residents of Tennessee and Virginia more convenient fishing opportunities on South Holston Lake.

The new South Holston Permit will be available beginning July 1. Tennessee and Virginia residents may purchase the permit along with their state's resident license and fish all of South Holston Reservoir.

Previously, Tennes-

see residents were required to purchase a non-resident license to fish in the Virginia portion and likewise for Virginia residents wanting to fish in the Tennessee portion.

Tennessee residents can purchase the South Holston Lake Permit Type 63 for a cost of \$21. Tennessee residents must purchase the permit at Tennessee license agents. The DAILY EDITION · June 16, 2010 · Page 3

permit is required in addition to the Tennessee resident license when fishing in the Virginia portion of the lake. If fishing for trout, a trout license is also required.

In Virginia, the permit is called "South Holston Reservoir Fishing" and is \$21 there as well. Virginia residents must purchase the permit in Virginia.

South Holston Lake comprises an area of 6,336 acres in upper East Tennessee and 1,244 acres in Virginia. Anglers find good populations of smallmouth and largemouth bass, walleye, rainbow trout, black crappie, bluegill, as well as rainbow trout, brown trout, and lake trout.

Now Coonfoot come out of this unscathed, but then again, they say buzzards won't eat their own kind... -Gus



Penalty

December 22, 2008. The penalties address violations of the Tennessee Water Quality Control Act and the Tennessee Solid Waste Disposal Act.

"These are appropriate penalties in response to an unprecedented event," said Fyke. "We have said from the beginning of this process that civil penalties would come once the site had been stabilized and we had an opportunity to have a full picture of the damages."

This Order assessing penalties follows an Emergency Order issued immediately after the ash spill on January 12, 2009. The Emergency Order outlines the steps TVA must take to stabilize and remediate the Emory River and surrounding property, and remains in effect. This new Order specifically addresses the violations of Tennessee law resulting from the spill.

The \$11.5 million

penalty is to be paid, as follows:

\$2.5 million to TDEC by July 15, 2010;

At least \$2 million in Supplemental Environmental Projects to benefit the environment must be proposed by TVA and approved by TDEC by Dec. 31, 2010. If acceptable projects equaling at least \$2 million are not proposed by Dec. 31, TVA must pay any remaining balance;

\$2 million to TDEC by July 15, 2011;

\$2 million to TDEC by July 15, 2012;

\$3 million has been paid to reimburse the department's oversight costs, as required by the January 2009 Emergency Order. TVA must continue to pay these oversight costs over and above the \$11.5 million total assessment.

"Department personnel have been working with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency to oversee cleanup activities from the beginning,

and that will continue," said Sloan. "Significant progress has been . made, as signified by the completion of time critical activities, and there is much left to do. We are committed to seeing this cleanup through to completion."

The Commissioner's Order announced today specifically reserves the department's right to assess natural resource damages in the future. The Department of Environment and Conservation has obtained the services of Industrial Economics, Inc. to assist state and federal trustees in assessing and recovering natural resource damages from TVA as a result of the spill. Recovering natural resource damages is another step toward restoring these resources for the public.



For his safety and the safety of the public, Mr. Cook was arrested.

Officer DeBoer reported he also spoke with Cook's wife, Sharon Justine Cook, 46, who was charged with possession of schedule II (oxycodone) and possession of a legend drug (trazadone).

Sharon Cook told the officer she had pills in her pocket, which were identified as oxycodone and trazadone. Mrs. Cook couldn't produce a prescription for the medication.

Another person in the group was identified as Ralph Terry Cravens, 38, of Wild-

er, Tennessee, who was charged with four counts of possession of schedule II (oxycontin, morphine, roxicodone, and percocet), possession of schedule III (hydrocodone), possession of schedule IV (xanax) and possession of drug paraphernalia.

Records indicate Mr. Cravens appeared to be extremely nervous and uneasy while Officer DeBoer was talking with the Cooks, so he asked Mr. Craven for permission to search him for weapons. Prior to the search, the officer asked Cravens if he had anything illegal on him and Cravens replied he had pills in his front pocket.

There were numerous pills in Cravens'

pocket, which were recovered, and Cravens was advised of his Miranda Warnings.

Cravens also was found to have numerous pieces of metal clamps commonly used to crush pills. Cravens advised a cut piece of a straw and a pill crusher containing white powder found in the vehicle belonged to him.

Mr. Cravens also had \$1791 in U.S. currency in his possession.

Carol Michelle Abston, 41, also of Wilder, Tennessee was charged with possession of schedule II (oxycodone). Ms. Abston was the driver of the vehicle and told the officer she

and two prescription ottles in her purse that belonged to her.

Officer DeBoer located one pill which he identified as oxycodone, which she did not have a prescription for.

All four were taken into custody Thursday, at 11:31 PM. Officer Dennis Akins, LPD was also on scene.
