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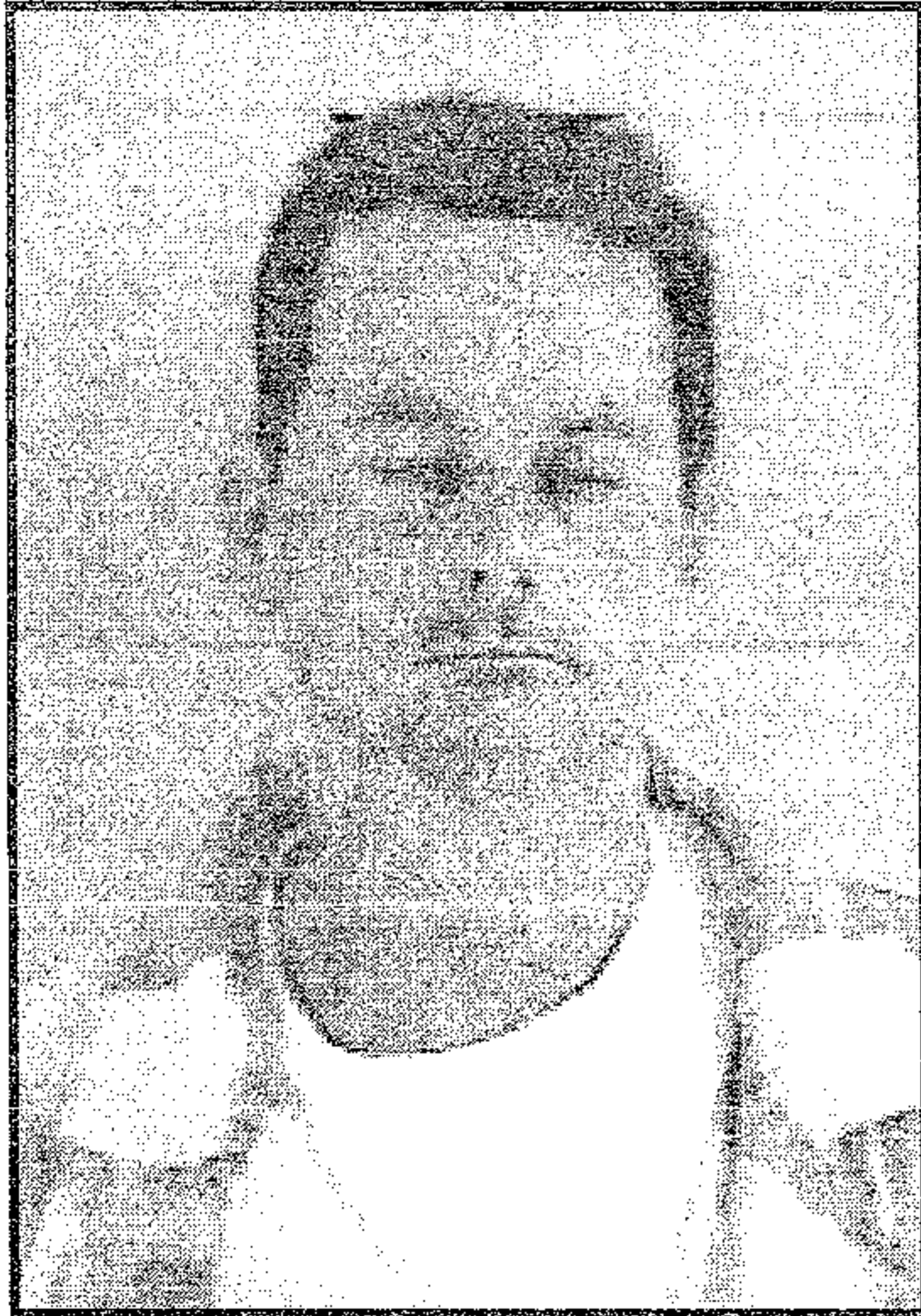

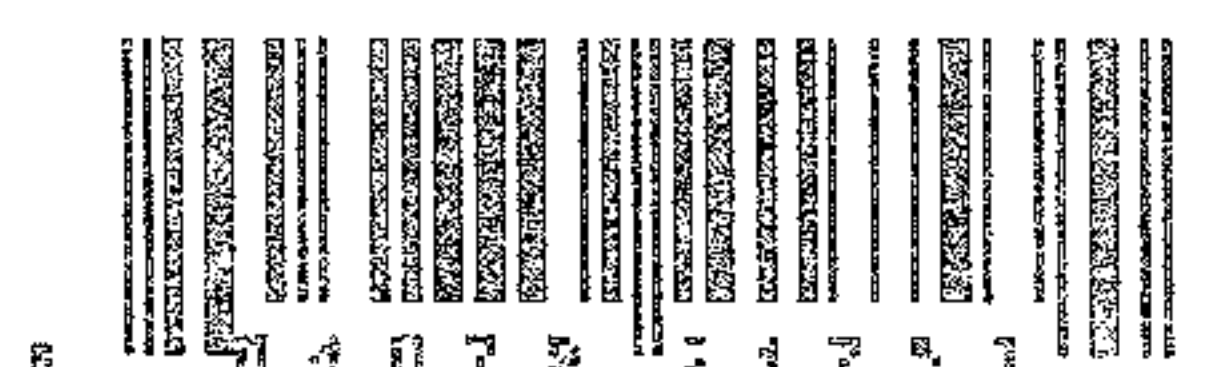

and two attachments from Knox County. While searching Mr. Odomirok the officer discovered two yellow pills believed to be percacet. The two attachments were for a DUI and leaving he scene of an accident. The warrant for theft was according to the affidavit, filed by Detective Jack Fine, LCPD, on May 17th, 2010, James D.

Report Highlights Importance of Family Engagement in Education

Students perform better in the classroom when their fami-

lies and their schools forge strong partnerships, according to a new report released today by the Comptroller's Offices of Research and Education Accountability.

The report, titled "Family Engagement in Education," notes that while it is difficult to precisely measure the benefits of family involvement on student achievement, studies have suggested there is a positive relationship.

Students with more engaged families tend to attend school more frequently, make better grades and graduate to higher levels of education. Those students are generally more likely to have better behavior and social skills as well.

The report discusses ways parents can become more engaged, including reading to children and helping with their homework, participating in school activities, setting high academic expectations, monitoring their children's academic performance, working with teachers to address concerns and advising older students with their college or career plans.

The report also documents some of the strategies used by Tennessee schools to reach out to parents. These include sponsoring family activities outside of normal school hours; creat-

ing new channels for communicating with parents via newsletters, phone messaging systems, online grade access and other nontraditional media outlets; and opening computer labs to parents as well as students.

Deputy Scarbrough made the arrest.



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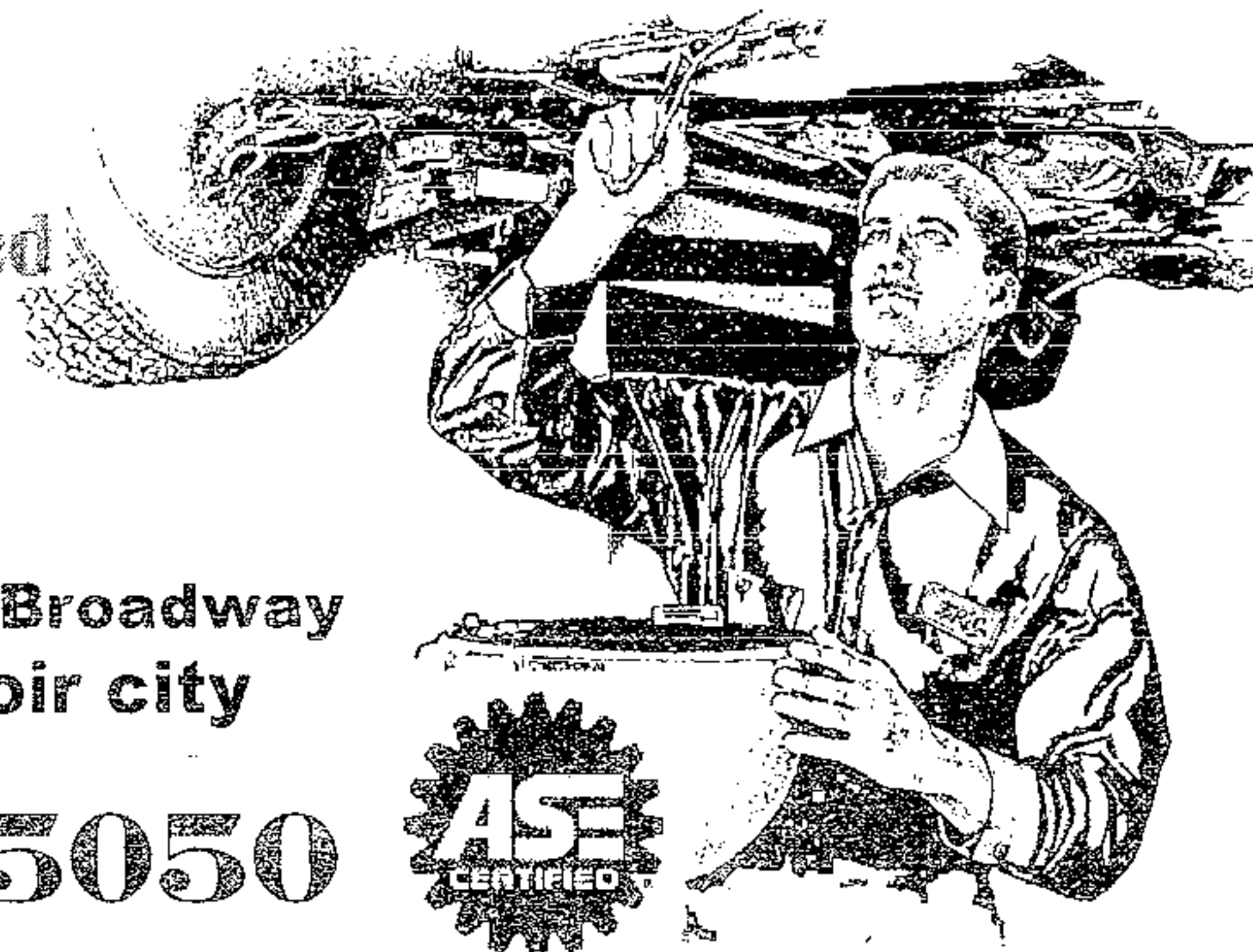

LCSO and BCSD team up in traffic stop

Malinda Sue Lear, 19, North Triglona Road, Greenback, was charged Monday, with DUI 1st offense and violation of the implied consent law.

According to records, Deputy Bobby Hamilton, LCSO, responded to a call on

North Triglona Road to back up Blount County Deputy, John Irwin, who was out on a traffic stop.

Deputy Irwin stated, Ms. Lear and her boyfriend were stopped in a driveway and arguing with each other when he observed them. Deputy Irwin realized they were both intoxicated, so he called Loudon County 911 Center, for a Loudon County deputy.

When Deputy Hamilton arrived, Ms. Lear was the driver of the white Jeep Grand Cherokee and had her boyfriend with her. Ms. Lear's eyes

were glassy and her pupils were pin point size. She had a strong odor of an alcoholic beverage on her breath and was very belligerent. Ms. Lear did poorly on field sobriety tasks. She became belligerent during the sobriety tasks and Deputy Hamilton stopped the tasks. She was very intoxicated and unable to operate a vehicle safely.

During inventory of the Cherokee, Deputy Hamilton found a pill bottle labeled sertraline 100 mg with 37 pills in it. The warning on the bottle stated (may cause drowsiness. Taking this medicine alone or with alcohol may lessen your ability to drive or perform hazardous tasks.) Ms.

Lear refused a blood alcohol test.

Lear's boyfriend was identified as James Alexander Gregory, 21, Eugene Disney Lane, Greenback He was charged with public intoxication. When Deputy Hamilton arrived, Deputy Irwin stated, he was driving down North Triglona Road when he saw Gregory on the side of the roadway, flipping his middle finger up at his girlfriend Ms. Lear and cursing her. Deputy Hamilton noticed during the interview with Mr. Gregory, he had a very strong odor of an alcoholic beverage on his breath, glassy eyes, pin pointed pupils, and slurred speech. Gregory told the deputy he had been

drinking and does use crystal meth. Deputy Hamilton made the arrests, with Deputy John Irwin, BCSD, standing by.

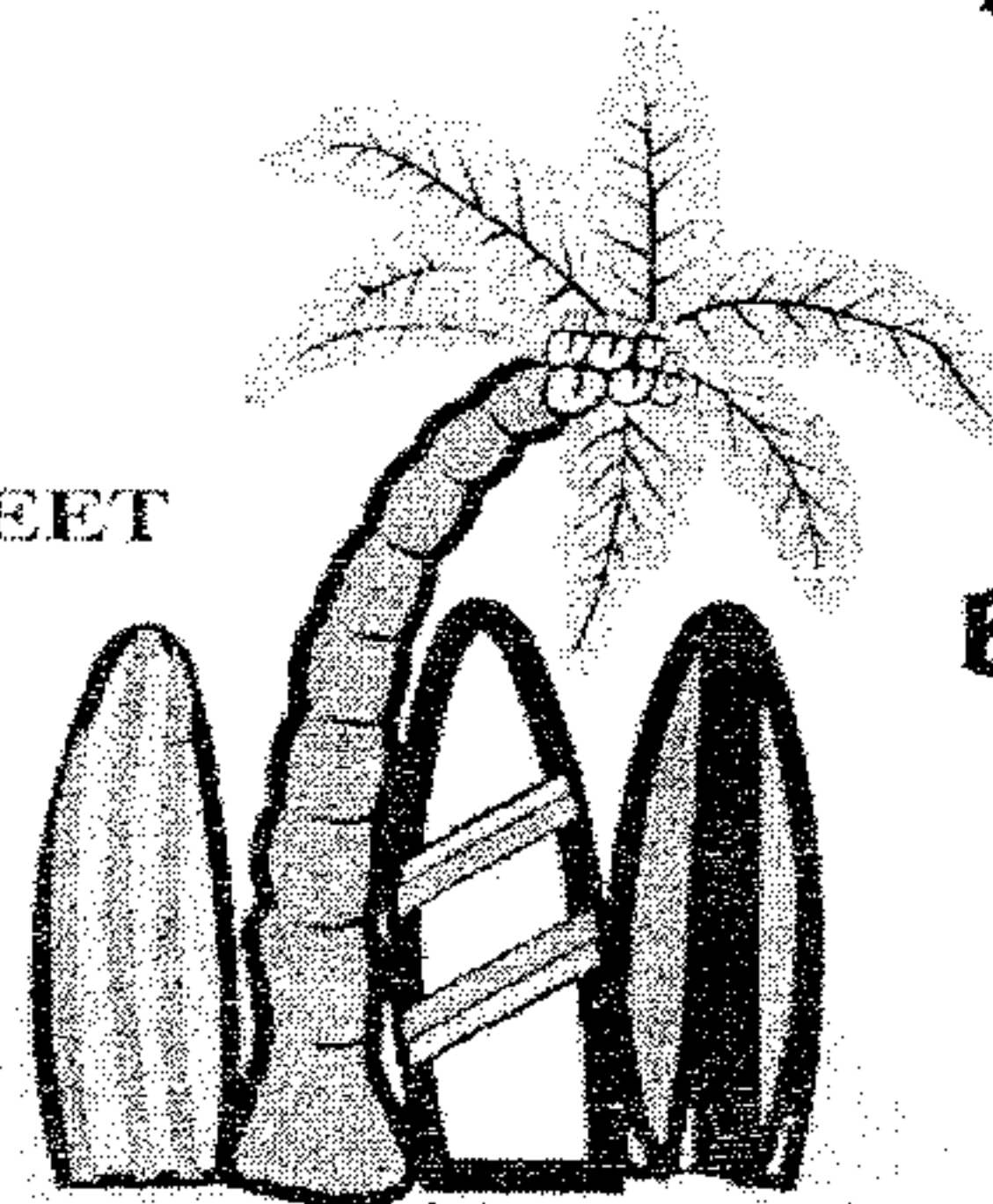

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Sheriff's Office Summer Academy Dates and Times Announced

Sheriff Tim Guider has announced the dates and times for the First Loudon County Sheriff's Office Summer Academy Classes for older children and teenagers. The Session I classes will be held July 12-15 for ages 8-13 and Session II is July 26-29 for ages 14-

17 from 10am - 4pm Monday - Thursday, for each class. Class location will be at the Justice Center. Lunch and beverages will be provided, along with a class T-shirt.

The series of classes if free of charge and will be taught by law enforcement professionals volun-

teering their time to share their expertise. Older children and young adults are at important places in their lives where they will begin to deal with peer pressure, realize their own potential, and set goals for their futures.

The purpose of the academy is to provide these older children and teens with a basic understanding of the training and requirements for their local law enforcement officers and to foster a cooperative partnership between them and the officers who serve them.

Session I will include Photo and Fingerprint ID cards of the children for parents; tours of detention and emergency facilities; familiarization with patrol

cars, fire trucks, and emergency vehicles; mock traffic stops, K-9 information and demonstrations; team building exercises; learning to be safe online; learn to find and take fingerprints; DARE introduction and drug education; and view court proceedings.

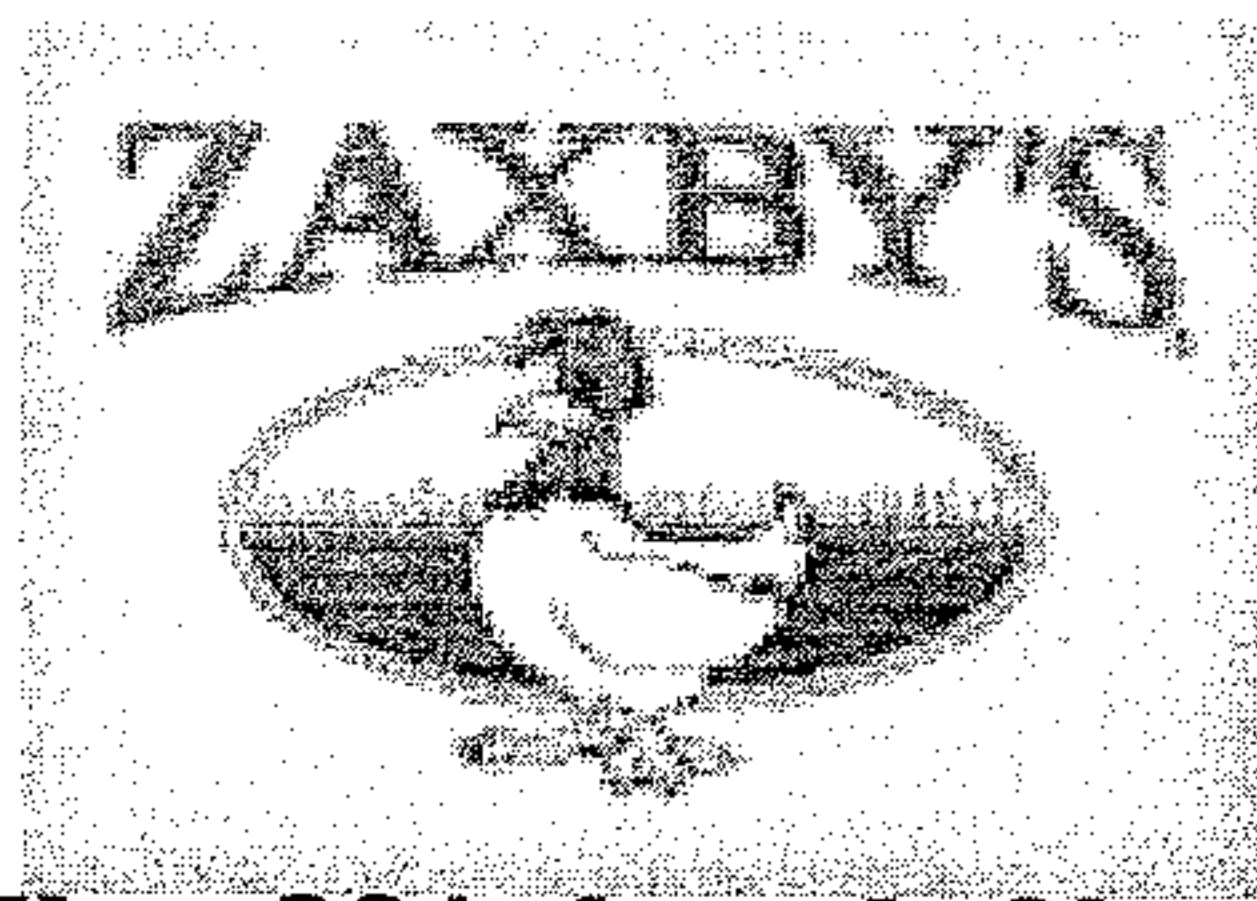
Session II will include the above along with computerized shooting exercises; participation in the mock traffic stops; how to assist in a crime investigation; and DUI simulation driving and other visuals about safe teen driving.

A parent or guardian may attend the classes with the stu-

dents, but that is not required.

Class openings are limited and Loudon County students will be given priority. Graduates will receive a certificate of completion at their graduation ceremony.

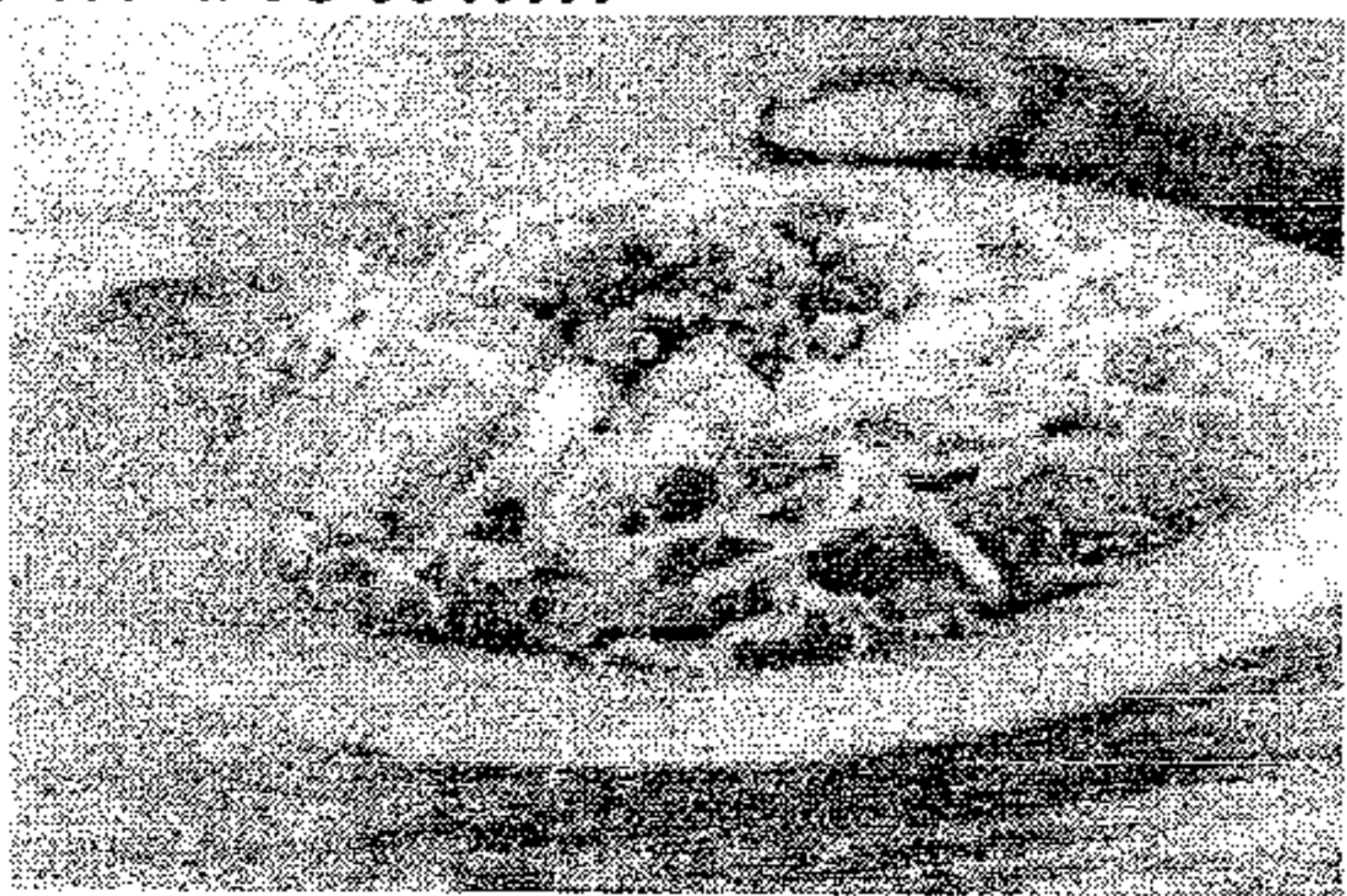

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A total of 17 boating accidents were reported across the state, resulting in 16 injuries for the July Fourth holiday period which ran from 6 p.m., July 2 through midnight, July 5. Chickamauga, Dale Hollow Lake, and the Ocoee River had three accidents each.

TWRA boating officers made 28 boating under the influence arrests during the period with almost one third (nine) coming from Old Hickory Lake. Kentucky Lake was a distant second with three arrests, with

Watts Bar, Boone, Ft. Loudoun, and Watauga lakes all having two arrests each.

In 2009, over the July Fourth holiday, there were 17 BUI arrests, one fatality, and 15 total accidents.

The nine fatalities is a drop from the 16 deaths that occurred during last year's July 4th weekend. Of the nine fatalities this year, six were vehicle occupants; two were motorcyclists; and one was a pedestrian. One of the fatalities was alcohol-related compared to two alcohol-related fatalities in 2009.

"While the preliminary numbers have declined, it is important to also point out that five of the people who died over the Fourth of July weekend were not wearing seat belts," stated Tennessee Highway Patrol Colonel Mike Walker. "We always stress the importance of wearing safety restraints. It could make a difference between life and death."

The Tennessee Highway Patrol conducted more than 80 driver license and sobriety checkpoints throughout the state during this past holiday weekend. The THP also teamed up with local law enforcement to conduct simultaneous

saturation patrols on interstates and highways.

Year-to-date preliminary statistics indicate 492 people have died on Tennessee roadways in 2010 compared to 494 fatalities in 2009. Please note that the statistical data for the July 4th holiday weekend and 2010 data are preliminary

and are subject to change due to some delays in reporting.

The Tennessee Department of Safety's mission is (www.TN.Gov/safety) to ensure the safety and general welfare of the public. The department encompasses the Tennessee Highway Patrol, Office of Homeland Security and Driver License Services. General areas of responsibility include law enforcement, safety education, motorist services and terrorism prevention.

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
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
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
