


deputy was there. Mr. Moore had an odor of an alcoholic beverage on his person and had marks on his right hand and could not say why his hand was hurt.

The driver, Mr. Barker ran the red light at



# Dykes

According to records, Thursday, at approximately 11:17 AM Sgt. Billy Hall, LCSO stopped a white Chrysler for speeding on Interstate 75 at the 84 mile marker. Sgt. Hall got consent to search the vehicle

from the driver, Michael C. Dykes.

The officer reported he discovered a large amount of prescription medication in the passenger compartment and the trunk area. Mr. Dykes admitted to going to two different doctors to obtain the medica-

tions.

Dykes also advised he goes to a pain management clinic in Maryland to get alprazolam and oxycodone and he also visits an office Rossville Georgia to obtain methadone for addiction to oxycodone.

Dykes further stated he obtained the medications through deception.

A total of 407 3/4 methadone pills were discovered, approximately 320 of them from a pain clinic in Maryland and the remainder was from a methadone clinic in Georgia. A total of 95 oxycodone pills and 58 1/2 alprazolam were also found.

Dykes reportedly told the lawman he obtained the prescriptions via deception to feed an addiction he could not afford to control.

#### State Fire Marshal Receives Grant to Purchase Smoke Alarms

NASHVILLE- The Tennessee Department of Commerce and Insurance has received a \$241,000 grant to fund a smoke alarm installation program, fire alarm training for staff and one-and-two family dwelling code training.

The Fire Prevention and Safety Grants (FP&S), administered by the Department of Homeland Security, awarded the grant. The department received \$153,000 to purchase 8,000 smoke alarms to help reduce the number of home fire deaths in Tennessee. Smoke alarms for the hear-

ing impaired will also be purchased. The Tennessee Fire Incident Systems reports that between 2003 and 2007, 34% of residential structure fires had no working smoke alarms. Home fires with working smoke alarms were 42% less likely to result in a fire death. A study by the U.S. Fire Administration ranked Tennessee with the fourth highest rate of fire deaths in 2005.

The goal of the smoke alarm installation program is to equip community organizations and fire departments with

free smoke alarms to install in needy households in their communities. Interested organizations must make an application to the State Fire Marshal's Office and show proof of having the tools and manpower necessary to install them and the ability to find needy households. Alarms will not be issued to organizations that give alarms away without installing them. Interested parties can contact Jeff Huddleston at jeff.huddleston@tn. gov for more informa-

Funding of \$88,000 was also received to provide residential building code training to the State Fire

Marshal's Office staff and other state code inspectors, and for fire alarm training for staff.

Jackie V. Kersey, of Cleveland, landed a 2 lbs, 2 oz. yellow perch that measured 14 3/4 inches in length. He used a minnow on a 10-lb. test line while fishing with a 7-foot Berkley Bionix rod and Pfleuger Gold Medalist Pro reel.

The new record surpasses a tie for the previous record of 1 lb., 15 oz., shared by a pair of anglers. Danny Casson caught his fish in 1992 while fishing on the nearby Hiwassee River. David C. Lyons landed his fish in August 1996 while fishing on Melton Hill Reservoir.

The criteria to be considered for a state record fish along with the new record application and instructions, state records and fishing license information are in the 2010 TWRA Tennessee Fishing Guide. Information is also available on the TWRA website at by clicking on "Fishing" located on the left side of the home page.
