



the patrol unit peacefully. Once the door was shut, he kicked the rear driver's side window out of unit #408. Narmore was tased by Loudon County Sheriff's Department.

Due to safety purposes, Sgt. Lynette Ladd, LCPD didn't want to transport Narmore to the jail without a rear window so he was moved to patrol unit #404 and was placed in leg shackles.

Narmore once again kicked the rear window, causing it to bow

out. He was then transported to the Loudon County Jail. Upon arrival, Narmore was still extremely violent. He was threatening and cursing aggressively. EMS were on scene at the jail but Narmore refused any medical treatment.

According to numerous affidavits filed by Detective Jack Fine, and according to several victim's reports; sometime between the dates of July 15th, 2010 and August 19th, 2010, Narmore entered a 2004 Spartan motor home belong-

ing to Marjorie McCall of South Northshore Drive. The motor home was in storage at 520 Twin Lakes Drive in Lenoir City. Gordon Narmore entered the motor home by prying the door open, then removed a 32 inch JVC LCD High Definition TV, valued at \$800.

\$500 Approximately worth of damage was done to the door when Narmore made entry.


On Sunday, August 15th, 2010, Narmore entered a Keystone Cougar camper trailer belonging to Charles Riddle of Hill Top

Drive in Loudon County. The camper was in storage at 520 Twin Lakes Drive in Lenoir City. Narmore pried on the door of the camper and entered, damaging the door in the process. Narmore removed a 26 inch Sanyo TV, valued at \$300. He also forced his way into a storage area at the front of the camper and removed a 12 volt car battery valued at \$75. Narmore caused approximately \$1000 worth of damage in order to make entry. affidavit Another states, sometime between August 7th, 2010 and August 16th, 2010, attempted Narmore to enter a Keystone Springdale camper trailer belonging to Brian Roe, of Seminole Circle in Loudon. The camper was in storage at 520 Twin Lakes Drive in Lenoir City. Narmore damaged the camper door by prying on it, with the intent of trying to commit a burglary. Over \$500 worth of damage was done to the door in the process. Sometime between August 15th, 2010, and August 16th, 2010,

Narmore also attempted to enter a Sun Valley Extreme camper, belonging to Timmy Wear of Strange Road in Lenoir City. The camper was in storage at 520 Twin Lakes Drive in Lenoir City. Narmore damaged the camper door by prying on it, with the intent of trying to commit a burglary. Over \$500 worth of damage was done to the door.

According to another affidavit, on August 7th, 2010, at approximately 10:31 PM, and according to the victim's report, the victim gave Gordon Narmore a ride from McGhee Square Apartments to Ingles Store. The victim had his young daughter in a car seat in the front seat and Narmore rode in the back. The victim made a stop at Weigels, to use the ATM machine and when he returned to the vehicle he noticed \$35 was missing from his console.

When he questioned Narmore, they began arguing and Narmore reached up and opened the front passenger (see Narmore cont. pg. 8)





leader of the THP." Walker began his work as a Tennessee State Trooper in July of 1977. During the next 30 years, he worked as a road Trooper; served stints in both the Training, and Planning and Research divisions; was Director of Driver Licensing and Control; and performed duties as Troop Lieutenant, District Administrative Lieutenant and Director of the Professional Standards division. Walker was appointed

Colonel in March of 2006.

"It has been a great ride," said Colonel Walker, just weeks shy of his 57th birthday.

"You can bet when I walk away from here, I will still be the biggest supporter of the Department of Safety, and especially the Tennessee Highway Patrol."

Walker's support for a structure to manage investigative and disciplinary processes for the department was instrumental in the organization and development of the Office of Professional Responsibility (OPR), a unit within the Profession-

al Standards Bureau. Highlighting the OPR list of accomplishments is a revamped hiring and promotional process without partisan political influence. Established in 2007, the bureau was recommended in the Kroll Report commissioned by Governor Phil Bredesen.

Walker has honed the agency's focus highway traffic safety, positioning the THP as a lead organization in safety programs. The number of statewide traffic fatalities has declined nearly 25 percent between the years 2006 to 2009. In lieu of this achievement, Colonel Walker received the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration's (NHTSA) Award of Public Service in March of 2009 for his leadership in statewide traffic reimprovement cords and the implementation of an electronic crash reporting system for Tennessee. In addition, the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP) national law enforcement challenge has ranked

THP as the top agency twice over the past five years and in the top-three two times during that period. Agencies were judged on its efforts to enforce laws and educate the public on occupant protection, impaired driving and speeding.

After a 35 percent decline in large truck related traffic fatalities, the THP also received 2009 Commercial Vehicle Safety awards from the American Association of Motor Vehicle Administrators (AAMVA) and the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration (FMCSA).

"During his tenure, Colonel Walker has been a true champion of safety," stated Commissioner Mitchell. "His dedication to reducing highway fatalities has led to a solid partnership with the Tennessee Department of Transportation and implementation of the Between the Barrels program. The Colonel played a key role in reaching and encouraging thousands of teenagers to become better, safer drivers." Colonel Walker's latest achievement was spearheading an upgraded communications system for State Troopers to communicate more effectively. The current 1950s tech-

nology was approved

for modernization by the 2010 Tennessee General Assembly.

"My biggest concern as the outgoing Colonel is trooper safety, and my biggest regret is not being here to see the improvement of communications technology through," said Colonel Walker. "Enhanced technology is essential for troopers to remain safe throughout the state. My goal has always been for each trooper to make it home at the end of each shift."

Walker attended the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga and is a graduate of the 57th class of the Northwestern University Traffic Institute's Police Administration Training program. He began his law enforcement career as a police officer for Signal Mountain.

"I am honored to have enjoyed a long career with the Tennessee Highway Patrol," Colonel Walker said. "I consider the people I have worked with over the years as my family. Even though I have left the building, I won't be very far. The THP will always hold a special place in my heart."

After being taken into custody and served the warrants, Narmore incarcerated in Loudon County Jail where he received charges after reportedly assaulting an inmate and damaging county

According to reports, the day after he was arrested, Sunday, around 6:30 PM, Deputy Robert Gray, LCSO charged Gordon Narmore with assault when he assaulted another inmate. The inmate was standing at the gate asking the officer in the control room some questions when inmate Narmore came up behind him and started swinging, making contact with the inmate on the right side of the face causing
