Area man gets 32 years for violent crime spree

A local man recived his thrid DUI charge when LCPD's Sgt. Foster saw his vehicle cross over the center line several times on Broadway and after stopping it found the driver reportedly was intoxicated.

Robert E. Keith, 41, Antioch Church Road East, Lenoir City was charged with DUI 3rd offense and implied consent violation.

According to reports, Saturday, at approximately 10:13 PM, Sgt. Joe Foster, LCPD witnessed a tan Buick going East on Broadway near the EZ Stop. The vehicle crossed over the center line several times and turned North on C Street.

The sgt. stopped it at 1st Avenue and identified the driver as Robert Keith.

Keith had a strong odor of an alcoholic beverage on his person, slurred speech, was unsteady on his feet and was unable to perform field sobriety tasks. He stated he'd had 4 beers. Upon arrival at the jail, Mr. Keith was read the implied consent form and refused the test.

He had a strong odor of an alcoholic beverage about his person and performed poorly on field sobriety tasks. Mr. Lamb told the deputy he had two drinks and was on pain medication for his leg. Due to the keys in the ignition and Mr. Lamb being in the driver's

seat and therefore in physical control of the vehicle and had already hit something with the right front wheel, causing damage to the right front of the vehicle, he was arrested for DUI. He was read the implied consent form and refused a BAC test. An inventory of the Toyota was performed and a fifth of Crown Royal was discovered with only 1/4 left in the bottle, with Mr. Lamb's prescription of hyoscyamine. It stated right on the bottle, alcohol will intensify the effects. Mr. Lamb was also cited for violation of implied consent. The passenger was identified as Tina Lynn Quillen, 38, Pochontos Road, Knoxville. She was charged with public intoxication. When asked, Mrs. Quillen stated she had no idea how much alcohol she consumed. She had a strong odor of an alcoholic beverage about her person and slurred speech. Mrs. Quillen was deemed a danger to herself or others if left in the public in her intoxicated state and was



Arrest attack on impaired driving, beginning today, September 3, at 6 p.m. and ending Monday, September 6, at 11:59 p.m.

"In an effort to crackon impaired down driving incidents, our state troopers will join Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD) and thousands of other law enforcement and highway safety agencies throughout the state and nation this holiday. period," Department of Safety Commissioner Dave Mitchell said. "Drunk driving is one of America's deadliest crimes. The THP will be vigilant in protecting our roadways from the careless decisions of those who choose to put Tennesseans in harms way."

Over the 2009 Labor Day holiday, nine people were killed in nine fatal crashes on Tennessee roadways, down from 12 people killed on Tennessee roadways in 2008. Throughout the state in 2008, 327 people were killed in crashes where the driv-

er or motorcyclist had a blood alcohol concentration (BAC) of .08 or higher. That is down from 377 people killed in 2007 with a BAC of .08 or higher.

Nationwide in 2008, nearly 12,000 people died in highway crashes due to impaired driving. The picture for motorcycle riders is particularly bleak. Two years ago, 32 percent of motor vehicle fatalities were drivers or motorcycle riders with BACs of .08 or above. Additionally, in 2008, the percentage of drivers with a BAC of .08 or above was highest for motorcycle riders with 29 percent.

"Our message is simple - zero tolerance. If you are over the limit, you are under arrest," said THP Colonel Mike "Impaired Walker. driving is not a joke; people have been tragically killed as a result of someone else's poor judgment. Our goal is to prevent that from happening by patrolling state roadways in full force and making

no excuses or exceptions for those driving under the influence."

The THP has established sobriety checkpoints in high volume and high crash corridors across the state to look for aggressive and impaired drivers as well as safety belt violators. Last year, state troopers issued 55 DUI, 14 reckless driving, two public drunkenness, and 21 open container tions during the Labor Day period.

While drunk driving is especially common among young males, data shows that an increasing number of females are being arrested and convicted for driving while impaired. In Tennessee, the percentage of female DUI arrests between 2002 and 2009 increased by 4.2 percentage points from 18.5 percent in 2002 to 22.7 percent in 2009. The percentage of DUI convictions in Tennessee against females increased from approximately 18 percent of DUI convictions in 2008 to about 21 percent of DUI convictions in 2009.

Boating

the single most effective way to protect boaters and reduce drowning in boating accidents. Eighty percent of those who drown in boating accidents were not wearing a life jacket. So far in 2010 on Tennessee waters, there have been 158 accidents and 18 fatalities. TWRA boating officers have made 146 boating under the influence (BUI) arrests. Heading into the Labor Day holiday period in 2009. there were 128 accidents with 13 fatalities and 135 BUI arrests.

Last year, over the Labor Day holiday, there were two boating-related fatalities and nine total boat accidents. TWRA boating officers made six boating BUI arrests over the weekend.

The TWRA wants all those who visit the waterways to have an enjoyable time. However, TWRA officers will be on the watch for dangerous boating behavior, such as BUI and other reckless operation.

Along with the use of life jackets, TWRA wants to stress the responsible use of alcohol while boating. It is important to consider the effects of drinking and driving whether on water or land. In a boat on the water, the effects of alcohol increase because of external stressors such as engine vibration, wave motion and glare from the sun. Operating a boat with a Blood Alcohol Content of .08 or higher is illegal in Tennessee, the same as operating a motor vehicle.

Changes Made to Deer Carcass Importation Proclamation

NASHVILLE --- The Tennessee Wildlife Resources Commission has made an amendment to a proclamation that was established May concerning the addition of states from which deer carcasses are prohibited for importation unless bones were removed to aid in the prevention of chronic wasting disease (CWD) in Tennessee.

Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency officials had earlier recommended that the states of Virginia and Missouri along with the entire state of Illinois be added to the list of states to be included in the prohibition. The prohibitions came as a response to the discovery of CWD in white-tailed deer in these states.

After internal discussion on the enforceability of these regulations and discussions affected with the states, the TWRA recthat the ommended prohibition zones in four states (Illinois, Missouri, Virginia and West Virginia) be reduced to those areas where CWD is known to occur or where the affected state has established containment zones. The TWRA proposed the change in an effort to lessen the burden on state sportsmen while still providing adequate protection of Tennessee's deer population from CWD.

The Virginia counties that are affected are Frederick and Shenandoah. Hampshire County in West Virginia and Linn County in Missouri are the only

affected counties in those respective states. In Illinois, the area continues to be that north of Interstate 80. Chronic wasting disease is a serious neurologic disease of whitetailed deer and other ungulates such as elk. Tennessee has adopted a number of measures, both for wildlife and farm animals, to reduce the likelihood that CWD might be introduced into the state.
