Yount Road, Knoxville, was charged with aggravated burglary, theft of property \$500 - \$1000 and public intoxication.

Deputy Rondel Branam, LCSO, reported he was dispatched to a burglary in progress at a Lake Drive residence and while en route learned two white males had kicked in the front door of the home, assaulted a male and were standing outside the residence.

The officer reported he arrived to find Deputy J.C. Schultz standing outside with the pair, who were identified as Idol and Perkins. Once it was determined they did not live at the home they were detained.

Records indicate one of the

victims advised he and a female were in their bedroom when they heard someone kick in their front door. When they heard someone trying to get into their bedroom he held the door with his body until a short, white male with a full beard, later identified as Idol, forced the door open and choked him.

The man said he was able to get away from his attacker and told both men to leave, that he was calling the police.

The men left and took several bags of clothing belonging to the woman without her permission. The clothing, valued at over \$500, was found in the men's pickup truck, which was still running in the driveway when police arrived on scene.

Idol and Perkins both had the odor of an alcoholic bev-



TWRC to Meet January 20-21 in Nashville

NASHVILLE --- The Tennessee Wildlife Resources Commission will hold its first meeting of 2011, Jan. 20-21. The meeting will be held at the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency Region II Ray Bell Building in the Ellington Agricultural Center.

At the January meeting, the TWRA will seek direction from the TWRC whether to move forward through the regulation process and request the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to establish a hunting season for sandhill cranes in 2011-12. The 2011-12 regulations process would start in February.

The agency presented the commission, at its June 2010 meeting, a draft hunt plan for hunting sandhill cranes in Tennessee in 2011-12. This plan was approved by the Mississippi and

Atlantic Flyway Councils in July 2010. The directed Commission the Agency to develop unis piam as a result of a request made by the Tennessee Wildlife Federation.

A period for accepting public comments began last fall concerning the possibility of the establishment of a sandhill crane hunting season. The agency is accepting input until Jan. 19.

Plans for the state's third managed elk hunt include a few slight changes. If approved by the TWRC, the hunt would be held Oct. 17-21, 2011 with five permits available for antlered bulls only. Four of the elk permits will again be randomly selected through a drawing conducted by the TWRA while the fifth permit will be donated to an organization, yet to be determined, which will help raise monies for Tennessee's elk program. The request for proposals (RFP) for this fifth permit has been sent out, and the deadline for submission is by the end of January.

As in the previous two hunts, hunters will once again be assigned to one of five elk hunting zones (EHZ). Additional tagging procedures will aiso require hunters to adequately mark the exact location of their harvest.
