





The officer asked for and was given consent to search.







Sex Offender nabbed

An Old Midway Road, Lenoir City man was jailed after officials learned he is a registered sex offender who reportedly had been in contact with multiple juveniles, which is against state law.



Elk Hunt

NASHVILLE Three hunters recorded harvests during Tennessee's third managed elk hunt held Oct. 17-21 at North Cumberland Wildlife Management Area.

It marks the second straight year that three of the five participants harvested an elk during

the hunt. All five participants were Tennessee residents.

Richard Rutherford of Walland was the first person to harvest an elk in this year's hunt. The weight was unavailable for the elk with a 5x4 rack size that was harvested on the first day.

The other two elk were taken on the third

day of the hunt. Arthur Moreland of LaVernge, who was the successful bidder for the EBay permit offered by the Tennessee Wildlife Re-Foundation, sources harvested a 5x5 elk that weighed 532 pounds dressed.

The third and final elk and the largest harvest this year was taken by Loudon County has worked to make resident Jody Moore. He harvested a 7x6 elk that field dressed at 620 pounds.

Since the historic first managed hunt in 2009, 11 elk have been harvested. All five participants recorded harvests in the inaugural hunt.

Five elk hunting zones were selected on the Royal Blue Unit

of the North Cumberland WMA, each about 8,000 acres. The division helps ensure the harvest was spread over the entire core of the elk zone. Each hunter was assigned a zone through a random hand-held drawing.

The Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency habitat improvements at North Cumberland WMA. The first arrival of 50 animals came in December 2000, the first elk to be in Tennessee since they were reported in Obion County in 1865. Studies have proven that the elk herd is seeing an annual growth rate of 13-15 percent.



"Halloween should be a time for good family fun," said Department of Safety and Homeland Security Commissioner Bill Gibbons. "However, children, their parents and all motorists must remember that safety comes first. We are urging all motorists to act responsibly, designate a sober driver and keep roadways safe for trick-or-treaters across Tennessee."

Over 1,500 people in the U.S. died in crashes during the Halloween time period from 2000-2009. According to the National Center for Statistics and Analysis (NCSA), in 2009, 48 percent of all highway fatalities across the nation on Halloween night involved a driver or motorcycle rider with a Blood Alcohol Concentration (BAC) of .08 or higher.

Last year in Tennessee, one person was killed on Halloween between midnight, October 31, 2010, through 6 a.m., November 1, 2010. That compares to two people killed in two crashes on Halloween during the same time period in 2009. Both of the fatal crashes in 2009 involved

alcohol.

"Unfortunately, the Halloween holiday weekend is a dangerous one due to impaired drivers," said THP Colonel Tracy Trott. "We all have a responsibility to keep our children safe from those who blatantly disobey the rules of the road. Our State Troopers will be working around the state to make sure that violators are caught and roadways are safe this Halloween."

Halloween is the most dangerous day of the year for pedestrian injuries and deaths among young children. The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) found that the number of deaths among young pedestrians (ages 5-14) is four times higher on Halloween evening than any other evening of the year. Thirty-eight percent of all young (under age 16) pedestrian fatalities occurred between 3 p.m. and 7 p.m., and alcohol involvement – either for the driver or pedestrian – was reported in 48 percent of traffic crashes that resulted in pedestrian fatalities.

Halloween safety tips for parents, children and motorists are listed below.

HALLOWEEN SAFETY TIPS
Tips for Motorists -

· Slow down. Watch for children

· Be extra alert when pulling in and out of driveways.

· Be especially alert for children darting out from between parked vehicles and from behind bushes and shrubs. They're excited and may not be paying attention.

Do not pass other vehicles that have stopped in the roadway. They could be dropping off children.

If you are driving to a Halloween party, put your mask on after you park the car.

Never drink and drive – tonight or any night. If you are partying, designate a driver. Tips for Parents

Adults should accompany children at all times and supervise their "trick or treat" activities.

Teach children to "stop, look left-right-left, and listen" before they cross the street.

Instruct children to stay on sidewalks and to cross only at corners or crosswalks.

· Use a flashlight and wear retro-reflective strips or patches on your clothing or costume to be more visible to motorists.

· Be certain that the mask does not obstruct vision or hearing.

Ensure that costumes do not impede walking or driving ability.

Tips for Pedestrians (children and adults)

Require children to wear retroreflective materials and carry a flashlight at dawn and dusk and in other low-light situations, such as rainy or foggy weather.

Before crossing a street, stop at the curb or edge of the road and look left, right and left again to be sure no cars are coming. Continue to check for traffic while on the street.

· Walk – never run – from house to house or across the road.

· Cross the street only at intersections and crosswalks.

When crossing at an intersection with a traffic light, be sure to watch for turning cars. Obey all pedestrian signals.

· Walk on sidewalks whenever possible. If there are no sidewalks, walk on the left side of the street facing traffic.

The Tennessee Department of Safety's mission is (www.TN.Gov/safety) to ensure the safety and general welfare of the public. The department encompasses the Tennessee Highway Patrol, Office of Homeland Security and Driver License Services. General areas of responsibility include law enforcement, safety education, motorist services and terrorism prevention.




