





One backpack contained a soda bottle full of Coleman fuel, one bottle containing muratic acid, several pieces of rubber tubing, a bag of ammonium nitrate pellets and several needles.

pack there were plasbaggies, several measuring cups, bowls with white powder residue and a needle. Mr. Millsaps admitted to being a meth cook. Millsaps told the agent he planned on cooking meth that night and he cooks on a regular basis. Millsaps told the truck box, the agent agent that out of a 12 hour box of pseudo he produces approximately two and a half grams of meth. Millsaps admitted to using meth earlier in the day.





"In today's competitive market, it's important for farmers to reassess their efforts in the marketplace and how they can best reach today's consumer," Johnson said. "I'm pleased to have authorized this referendum and to have provided an opportunity for producers to have a say in determining their business future."

Tennessee cattle producers cast their votes last week in a statewide referendum authorized by the Tennessee Department of Agriculture. The referendum was requested by the Tennessee Cattlemen's Association, the state's largest cattle organization.

More than 56 percent

or 718 of the 1,275 producers who cast ballots at local UT Extension offices supported the measure. The measure increases by 50 cents the assessment farmers pay per head of cattle sold to support in-state education research, and promotion of beef. Only a majority of the votes cast were needed to pass.

will go into effect in the spring. Currently, cattle producers pay \$1 per head to help build consumer demand for beef products nationally. The national beef program was authorized by a vote of cattle producers and implemented in 1985.

Tennessee ranks as one of the top beef producing states in The 50 cent increase the nation with nearly

two million head of cattle. According to the USDA National Agricultural Statistics Service, cattle and calves generated \$545 million in Tennessee farm cash receipts in 2010, making beef the state's top commodity. There, are approximately 47,000 cattle producers in the state.





farmer coop for violation of a brake light law. Upon the driver giving permission to search the vehicle Mr. Evans was asked to step out. During a pat down Mr. Evans was asked if he had any weapons or needles and said he had none. Mr. Evans was then found to be in possession of a hypodermic needle stuffed in his sock. The vehicle search revealed a 15 count box of Aleve D Sinus medication that is commonly used to manufacture meth.

Mr. Evans told agents he had purchased the

box at a Loudon Pharmacy and was planning to sell it to a meth cook for \$50. Evans did acknowledge he knew what the box of medicine was to be used for.

Evans was also found to have outstanding warrants in Meigs and Bradley Counties.
