

Key Issues

Synthetic drugs such as K2 (synthetic marijuana) have devastating mental and physical side effects. They are spreading across our state and have the potential to eclipse methamphetamine as the most dangerous drug in Tennessee. These drugs are often marketed in convenience stores as incense, bath salts or plant food, and commonly feature cartoon characters on package labels.

In 2012, Tennessee's district attorneys will seek to increase penalties for those who sell and produce synthetic drugs. Because synthetics constantly change to

capitalize on existing legal gray areas, the DAs will also work to make certain these substances remain illegal and out of reach of our youth.

Prescription drug abuse is not new to Tennessee, but can be addressed in a new, meaningful manner through common-sense steps that do not necessarily result in prison time. The DAs will propose more access to the state's prescription drug monitoring database by law enforcement, more active monitoring of that database; and a requirement that physicians and pharmacists check the database when prepain medications.

Our hope is that these

steps will reduce theft and distribution of legitimately prescribed medications, the operation of pill mills, the practice of "doctor shopping" and prescription fraud.

Following are additional issues of importance to the Tennessee District Attorneys General Conference in 2012:

Convicted felons are prohibited currently from owning and carrying firearms; however, present penalties for failing to abide by this law are not in line with the potential violent outcomes it seeks to prevent. Tennessee's DAs would like to see scribing or filling any the jail time increased to at least one year from

six months for armed felons with a prior nonviolent offense, and to at least two years for those with a prior violent offense.

Gang crime is a topic of importance in cities from East to West Tennessee. I, along with the rest of our state's DAs, believe the time is right to begin prosecuting gang crime in a meaningful way by automatically increasing sentencing to the next higher felony grade when offenses are committed by groups of three or more, as opposed to one on one. We cannot continue to allow robbery, home burglary and the infliction of serious bodily injury by groups of criminals to continue to be sentenced as though they were committed by an individual.

Lastly, we remain committed to making our roads and highways safer through refinements to laws dealing with impaired driving. The DAs' main objective in this area in 2012 will be to require greater use of alcohol-monitoring devices such as





No temporary lane closures will be allowed for construction on Tennessee roadways beginning at noon on Friday, December 23, 2011 through 6:00 a.m. on Monday, January 2, 2012.

"Nearly two million Tennesseans are expected to hit the roads to visit family and friends during this busy holiday travel period," said TDOT Commissioner John Schroer. "We want to do everything possible to minimize delays and provide maximum capacity on Tennessee roadways. We also want drivers to obey the rules of the road and arrive safely at their destinations."

Except for a few longterm closures which must remain in place for safety, all construction related closures will be suspended

during the holiday period. Workers may still be on site in some construction zones. Drivers should obey all posted speed limits, particularly in construction areas. Slower speeds are necessary in work zones due to the temporary layout of the roadway and will be enforced. Drivers convicted of speeding through work zones where workers are present face a fine of \$250 to \$500, plus court fees and possible increased insurance premiums.

"Drivers can expect to see increased law enforcement on the roads throughout the holiday with a particular focus on stopping drivers who are impaired," said Governor's Highway Safety Office Director Kendell Poole. "We want everyone to have a safe holiday so remember to buckle up, drive the speed limit and don't get behind

the wheel of a vehicle if you've had anything to drink."

AAA predicts holiday travel will increase nearly 2% in Tennessee this year, with more than 1.8 million expected to travel by automobile in the volunteer state between the Christmas and New Year's holidays. Across the U.S. 83.6 million people are expected to drive to their yearend holiday destinations, which represents 30% of

the total U.S. population.



Weight scales with white powder residue on them were also discovered in front of the passenger seat. Mr. Toepfer was placed under arrest and transported to the Loudon County Jail. Sgt. Jerramie Bowen, LCSO was also on the scene.

Detective Sartin made the arrest Saturday.


