

April Michelle Bookout, 29, also of Highway 411, Madisonville was charged with possession of schedule II hydrocodone.

According to reports, on Friday Agent Brendan DeBoer, 9th DTF along with members of the Loudon Police Department conducted a stop on Highway 11 and Highway 72 in Loudon. The vehicle stopped was a Chrysler van displaying a tag for a Ford.

Officer Brad Parks, LPD and Agent DeBoer made contact with the occupants of the van and identified them.

Molly Hunt was the driver and it was discovered Ms.

Hunt had just purchased a psuedoephedrine based product from the Rite Aide Pharmacy in Loudon.


After being read her Miranda Rights, Ms. Hunt advised Agent DeBoer the box was going to be given to a person who was known to have been investigated for the manufacture of methamphetamine. Ms. Hunt knowingly bought the box of medication for that purpose.

Officers identified the front seat passenger as Carol Johnson. Ms. Johnson was believed to have been purchasing a psuedoephedrine based product knowing it would be used to manufacture methamphetamine. Also found,

within reach of Ms. Johnson were numerous pills believed to be hydrocodone. She also had several adderall pills in a pouch in her purse.

The backseat passenger was identified as April Bookout and after receiving consent to search the vehicle, lawmen found numerous pills believed to be hydrocodone. No one could produce a prescription for the medication. The pills were found in the seat pocket, in front of where Ms. Bookout was sitting and no one claimed ownership. Ms. Bookout was duly charged and taken into custody.

The three women were then transported to the Loudon County Jail.



mobile household hazardous waste collection service will be in Hamblen and Loudon counties on April 2.

On Saturday, April 2, any Tennessee resident may bring his or her household hazardous waste to the following location. (Note that hours listed indicate the local time for each event.) * Loudon County Loudon County Justice Center at 12680 Highway 11 West in Lenoir City from 8 a.m. to p.m. The local contact for this HHW collection event is Gordon Harless at (865) 458-7298.

Since the program's inception in 1993, households have properly disposed of more than 20 million pounds of material.

HHW material is considered flammable, toxic, reactive and/ or corrosive and should not be placed with regular garbage.

Typical items to dispose of include cleaning fluids, pesticides, mercury thermometers and thermostats, fluorescent bulbs, lithium and button batteries, aerosols, adhesives, medications, brake fluid, swimming pool chemicals and paint thinner. Items not accepted include ammunition, explosives, alkaline batteries, paint, electronics, medical waste and any items from a school, commercial business or agri-business.

Many counties and municipalities meet the needs of local residents by providing collection of batteries, oil, paint, antifreeze and electronic scrap

- or BOPAE as it is sometimes called. When handled correctly, these BOPAE materials are minimally hazardous, but inappropriate for collection at household hazardous waste events. Contact your local city or county solid waste department to find BOPAE collection sites in your area.

When transporting materials to the site, place containers in sturdy boxes lined with newspaper to prevent spills

and cross-contamination the trunk of a car or back of a truck. Be sure to keep materials away from children and pets. Materials should be kept in the original container whenever possible. If not, place the waste in a plastic jug with a secure lid and label its contents.








The clerk refused to sell it to him and called police.


When officers arrived

Parks was seen moving around in the back of the car and upon checking on him, he was found with a white gooey substance all over his mouth where he'd tried to destroy several 10 mg. methadone pills by eating them.

There was a half eaten pill on the seat and three more concealed under the vehicle's seat. The seat had been checked prior to the start of Lt. Flynn's shift and there was nothing there.


The middle seat passenger was Randall Carter and a search of his person uncovered a small glass container of maybelline pink eye shadow that Mr. Carter had taken without paying for.


