Mother & companions shoot up pills on road trip with teen in vehicle


Mom & friends ask her son to hide stash of pills in bathroom

A Kingston woman and two of her companions are facing numerous charges including child abuse and drug possession after Officer April Farmer and fellow lawmen learned they had been injecting prescription pills while on a road trip and in the presence of her 15 year old son. As the investigation unfolded, officials discovered the woman and her friends had also asked the teen to hide a large amount of pills in a bathroom at a lo-



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

radiation levels in Tennessee. The Nuclear Regulatory Commission also has issued guidance stating that taking KI is not recommended. KI is given to people who are exposed to certain types of radioactivity.

"There is no reason for Tennesseans to purchase or take potassium iodide," said Health Commissioner Susan R. Cooper, MSN, RN. "The state has a supply of KI, but only to be used if there is an emergency or a risk of harm to Tennesseans. There is neither a cause of concern nor a risk to public or individual health. The state epi-

demiologist will recommend use of potassium iodide for residents if ever the need occurs."

KI is a chemical compound that can be used for short term protection of the thyroid gland from exposure to radioactive iodine, only one of many radioactive materials that may be released from a nuclear power plant. KI is only effective at protecting a person's thyroid gland from airborne or ingested radioiodine if taken within a relatively narrow timeframe prior to or after exposure. It does not protect any other organs in the body.

The Tennessee Department of Environment and Conser-

vation reported Wednesday that routine and ongoing state air monitoring indicates the presence of very low levels of Iodine-131, an isotope linked to the Japanese power plant. Tennessee's results are consistent with sampling results reported by federal agencies, licensees and neighboring states.

Because of the low threat of radioactivity exposure in the United States, the federal government is not advising people to take any protective measures at this time. Staying informed is the best step for people to take.

Radiation is present in our environment, usually at very low levels known as background radiation. In addition, people who undergo certain medical tests or procedures such as an X-ray are exposed to low-level radiation that is generally not

considered harmful.

TDOH has no reason to believe radiation from Japan will affect Tennessee. The levels of radiation being released from the damaged nuclear power plants in Japan are constantly being assessed. The department will continue to receive information from federal and state agencies to determine appropriate steps to take as the situation in Japan evolves, and will issue additional guidance as needed.



Routine and ongoing air monitoring performed by the state indicates the presence of very low levels of Iodine-131, an isotope linked to the Japanese power plant. Tennessee's results are consistent with sampling results reported by federal agencies, licensees and neighboring states.

"The Department of Environment and Conservation monitors for radiation in the environment as a regular course of business," said Environment and Conservation Commissioner Bob Martineau. "We can detect these isotopes at extremely low levels. These levels do not indicate a health concern of any kind, and we will continue to monitor."

Environment and Conservation's air samples reported on April 6 were collected on March 29 from fixed monitors near the Sequoyah and Watts Bar power plants, as well as a monitor in Dayton, Tenn. The results range from 0.044 to 0.089 picoCuries per cubic meter of air. These levels are within the range expected and are far below levels of public health concern.

In addition to its own monitoring, the department collects air and rainwater samples in Knoxville, Nashville and Oak Ridge for the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's RadNet program. The Tennessee Department of Agriculture collects milk samples for RadNet as well. All of those samples are sent to an EPA laboratory for analysis, and the results are available on EPA's website at www.epa.gov.



Veronica Ann White, 37, Gravely Road, Kingston was charged with tampering with evidence, felony possession of drug paraphernalia, public intoxication, and child abuse/neglect.

Albuquerque Cosper Head, 31, also of Gravely Road, Kingsport was charged with possession of schedule II oxycodone, possession of drug paraphernalia, public intoxication, and child abuse/neglect.

Christopher David Hixson, 20, Cherokee Village Drive, Kingsport was charged with possession of schedule II oxycodone, possession of schedule IV xanax, tampering with evidence, and contributing to the delinquency of a minor.

According to multiple affidavits filed by Officer April farmer, LPD; on April 5th, 2011, Officer Farmer responded to a call of a intoxicated person at the Taco Bell

Restaurant on Highway 72 in Loudon and upon arrival encountered a male matching the description given by dispatch. The man was identified as Albuquerque Head.

Albuquerque was unsteady on his feet, had slurred speech and appeared to be under the influence of a narcotic.

Numerous pills were found in Albuquerque's head band, that were tentatively identified as oxycodone. Also in the door where Mr. Head was sitting were numerous hypodermic needles and several of them were loaded with fluid.

After being mirandized, Mr. Head stated the needles and pills were his.

While traveling, Albuquerque and other occupants of the car were injecting prescription pills into their arms.

Mr. Head was part of a group traveling in a black Saturn driven by Christopher Hixson. The occupants were injecting narcotics into their arms with the full knowledge and in the presence of Mr. Hixson, the owner and driver of the car.

After taking Hixson into custody, he was found to be in possession of numerous pills in a secret compartment in his shoes after he'd advised officers he didn't have any pills on him. The pills recovered from Hixson's shoes were identified as oxycodone and xanax.

Verbal consent was given to search the car and as a result numerous types of drug paraphernalia and prescription pills were found. It was also found that one of the occupants in the vehicle was a 15 year old male.

The male juvenile was asked by the occupants of the vehicle, including his mother, Veronica Ann White, to hide a large amount of prescription pills in the bathroom of the Taco Bell, which were later recovered.

Ms. White was out in the public and appeared to be under the influence of a narcotic. She knowingly put her child in a position that could adversely affect his health and wellbeing by influencing him to stash illegal narcotics and being in the presence of individuals using hypoder-

mic needles.

Ms. White also attempted to conceal a bag of prescription pills by giving them to her 15 year old son to hide. The pills were evidence in an ongoing investigation.

Ms. White was further found to be in posses-

sion of several loaded syringes and a spoon with green powder residue in her purse.

Officer Farmer made the arrests. LPD Officers Brendan DeBoer and Bill Evans, were also on the scene.


determined he incurred while punching a support pole on the porch during the incident.
