



tation and aggravated sexual exploitation of a minor after a Loudon County Grand Jury deliberated less than an hour Tuesday.

Crandall was arrested in early July 2010 after Agent Daniel Schneider, 9th DTF and other officials executed a search warrant at a camper Crandall lived in beside his grandparents Dunn

Ridge home. The search resulted in the resulted in the resulted in the seizure of a laptop computer, a digital camera and a media card.

The media card contained naked photos of Crandall's son and an explicit image of a man, whom authorities testified was Crandall, and the little boy. The computer had approximately 25 child porn videos and about 200 images of child porn stored on it.

Following the raid, Crandall met with the agent at the Knoxville Police Department Internet Crimes Against Children Office where he also talked with Detective Tom Evans of the KPD's I.C.A.C. The conversation, Crandall stated he had removed the toddlers clothes and performed a sexual act him. He then said he again laid the little boy on the couch mounted.

him and performed a sexual act.

Schneider testified that when he confronted Crandall about the images of his son, he said Crandall at first was calm, but then cried and admitted he molested the toddler.

Crandall was not married but had visitation rights with his son, who lived with his mother, at the time of Crandall's arrest.

In closing arguments, Assistant District Attorney General Frank Harvey told jurors, "He raped his son, he took a picture of it and he downloaded child pornography."

Candall cried when the jury foreman read the verdict.

Judge Eugene Eblen set sentencing for Oct. 31. Crandall, who will remain in jail, faces prison time on the felonies.





Study Finds Uniform Grade Standards Haven't Significantly Changed Eligibility for Lottery Scholarships

There are as many or more public high school students eligible for lottery scholarships based on their grade point averages as there were before the state standardized the grading scale five years ago. That is the key finding in a report released today by the Comptroller's Offices of Research and Education Accountability (OREA).

Before a uniform grading system was implemented July 1, 2006, grade point scales varied from school district to school district. For example, some districts regarded scores between 90 and 100 as A grades, while other districts treated scores of 95 to 100 as A's.

That meant the numerical grade point averages awarded by school districts varied, which had the potential to affect eligibility for some students seeking Tennessee Education Lottery Scholarships.

The report, titled "Evaluation of Tennessee's High School Uniform Grading Policy," includes survey data from school districts across the state. Most of the survey respondents said the standardized scale was identical to or more lenient than the scales they had been using prior to the implementation date.

OREA concluded that the number of students who qualify for lottery scholarships based on grade point averages alone had remained the same or increased slightly over the

The report, which is available online at http://www.comptrol-ler1.state.tn.us/OREA/, addresses several other issues, including:

Despite the standardized scale, grading can vary from district to district, school to school and even classroom to classroom. Therefore, eligibility for lottery scholarships based on grade point averages alone can still vary among students of similar academic ability.

Although the change in state law requires standardization for the purpose of determining lottery scholarship eligibility, school districts are free to report grade point averages differently on student transcripts. These transcripts are often used by colleges and employers in evaluating recent high school graduates.

Private schools are not required to follow the standardized scale in determining their students' eligibility for lottery scholarships.

School districts have the option of adjusting grades for honors or advanced placement classes. However, not all schools offer those types of courses. That creates the potential for some students to have advantages or disadvantages in qualifying for lottery scholarships by grade point average.


