# VENISON ROAST Makes 14 servings.

7 lbs. venison roast, trimmed and trussed

4 tbsp, fresh rosemary, chopped

1 tbsp juniper berries, ground

2 tbsp sea salt

2 tbsp Tellicherry black pepper, freshly ground

3 tbsp rendered duck fat, pork lard or whole unsalted butter


To prepare oven: Preheat oven to 375 degrees.


To sear venison: Season venison with rosemary, juniper berries, salt and pepper. In large pan, melt duck fat. Add venison. Sear over medium high heat until well browned on all sides.

To roast venison: Place venison on roasting rack set inside large, lined sheet pan. Roast until internal temperature registers 110 degrees on meat thermometer.

To serve: Remove venison from oven. Cut away twine. Let rest for 10 minutes. Slice against grain. Serve immediately.
