I'M COMING TO YOU ONCE AGAIN TO ASK FOR YOUR VOTE to allow me to represent you on the Lenoir City Council for the next four years. (We came within thirtynine votes of winning the vacant seat in the 2010 election.)

TALKING POINTS

- FINANCES: I have over thirty years experience in Administrative Assistant and Executive and Financial Secretarial positions. I have studied the City Budgets and Annual Audits of the past few years. We CANNOT CONTINUE to borrow and overspend taxpayers' money under the assumption that our economy is going to improve!
- 2. HIRING: I think it is time we tell City Council that THE CITY AND LOUB JOBS ARE NOT THEIR JOBS TO GIVE AWAY! The Lenoir City government is not a family business and should not be run as if it were. We need a hiring policy that would insure equal opportunity for anyone to apply and be considered according to merit for every open position in the future. (This would not affect current employees.)
- 3. CONFLICT OF INTEREST: I would like to see us return to the original intent of the City Charter that made the City Council and the LCUB Board two separate groups of individuals. in a meeting and see this take place is unbelievable.)

4. ACCOUNTABILITY: I believe we need an appointed Ethics or Oversight Committee that would consist of at least ten city residents who are not related to (or business affiliates of) the Mayor or any member of City Council.

(Presently, the City Attorney oversees ethics in our City government. The City Attorney is hired by the City (Council.)



In all of the reports that I had watched and read, I hadn't even heard about major damage in any of these areas. "It's even worse than being reported!" I thought to myself.

As I was casually considering how to write about this event, there were real Christians out there coordinating, planning and establishing sites in which to base operations of relief efforts! Talk about loving like Jesus!

There will be numerous crews from Tennessee going to these locations including chain saw crews, mud out crews, food services, laundry services, chaplains, assessment crews, construction crews and others that I am not even aware of. It is also important to note that each of these crews will do this for free! Folks will be using their vacation time from work, driving their own vehicles, buying their own fuel, and driving 2000 miles from Tennessee to go rebuild churches, homes and lives, to encourage other Christians and to share the gospel of Jesus Christ with others who may not have accepted Jesus as their Savior..... YET!

limit for antlered bucks is three. No more than one antlered deer may be taken per day. Hunters are allowed the following antlerless bag limits: Unit A -4 antlerless deer; Unit L-3 antlerless deer per day and Unit B-1 antlerless deer.

For the exact boundaries of the different deer units, hunters can refer to the 2012 Tennessee Hunting and Trapping Guide, available where hunting and fishing licenses are sold and at all TWRA offices. The guide can also be viewed at TWRA's website at www.tnwildlife.org.

Muzzleloading firearms of .40 caliber minimum plus long bows, compound bows and crossbows are legal hunting equipment for this season.

Resident hunters, ages 16 through 64 must possess in addition to other appropriate licenses, an annual big game license for the equipment used. Lifetime Sportsman license, Junior Hunt/Trap/Fish, Adult Sportsman license and Permanent Senior Citizens license holders are not required to purchase supplemental big game licenses.

In addition to private lands, including public hunting areas, several wildlife management areas (WMAs) will be open to hunters during this muzzleloader season. Hunters need to refer to the 2012 Hunting and Trapping Guide for a listing of these WMAs or go to TWRA's website.

Tennessee's gun season for deer opens on the Saturday before Thanks-giving. This year's date is Nov.17.
