Blount Co. Woman Loses TennCare After Fraud Conviction

A Blount County woman has been sentenced after pleading guilty to TennCare fraud, and a court ordered her to be removed from the state's healthcare insurance program.

Renee Annette Moore,

43, of Maryville, pleaded guilty to one count of felony TennCare fraud and four counts of prescription fraud.

Moore was accused of posing as an employee of a doctor's office and calling in prescriptions to a pharmacy in Alcoa to obtain the addictive painkiller Hydrocodone. She used TennCare benefits to pay for the prescription.
