





Sunday's great music lineup will include the Bluetastics, Hickory Wind, and Just Looking Around.

Pioneer demonstrations throughout the weekend will include sorghum molasses making, blacksmithing, spinning, weaving, broom and soap making, among other time-

honored skills. A Civil War encampment will feature cannon firing and drills. Two stages will highlight both music and storytelling, with 20 different groups and individual performcrs sharing a variety of music. More than 100 craft booths will display an array of handmade wares, including woodworking, wrought iron, folk art, soaps and candles, leatherworks and basket weaving. Tempting visitors' taste buds, local groups will be on hand to serve homestyle country cooking, offering a variety of menu options. Geared toward the younger crowd, a special "Kidz Korner" stage will offer hourly activities both days, including craft making, old-time toys and games, and storytelling.

The event is open to the public and there is a suggested \$3 daily entry fee or \$6 for entry during the entire weekend, with all proceeds benefiting the festival. The event is co-sponsored by Fall Creek Falls State Park, the Tennessee Arts Commission and Friends of Fall Creek Falls, an organization focused on

preserving the natural and cultural riches of the park.
