lends itself to an ever expanding government controlled by closed door, special interest politics not the tax payers.

Home rule is not a new concept in Tennessee. Three of the state's largest four cities, Memphis, Chattanooga & Knoxville, operate under home rule charters. Knox County is a home rule charter county. Unlike what is happening now where local government has the power over the people, changing Loudon County to a home rule charter helps put some of the power back in the hands of the people.

The Charter, after passage by the voters, will include rules to make local government: more transparent, provide information to citizens before meetings, allow the public to speak on any issue during meetings, ensure everyone has an equal opportunity to compete for all county jobs and that the most qualified people are hired... just to list a few items. It can be written to affect the way our Loudon Commission wheel, sales and other taxes. It can also require that any general

obligation bonds be placed on the ballot for voter approval.

Much like putting other referendum on the ballot for approval, after a minimum 1,600 + verified Loudon County registered voters have signed the petition, a Charter Commission will be formed via the election of 21 people, three from each district. Once seated, after being elected, the Charter Commissioners will have nine months to complete their charter. These individuals addresses tax increases such as will not be paid for their service. The Charter Commission. will have up to \$50,000 for expenses, including legal fees, and other administrative costs. The Charter expenses would be recouped once a more efficient government is in place and the County Commission salaries are reduced to the level of comparably sized counties. They will not have to build a charter from scratch. There are many charters that have been written and in use that can be used as guides. The Charter Commission will have the authority to decide what goes into the Loudon County Charter or what does not. That is why it will be very important to select the right people to run and be elected to write the charter.

What could be changed for the better? Provided these ideas get included into the final charter, some citizen favorites are:

Term limits for elected officials (boards & commissions) & a recall process.

Prohibition of any elected officials and committee members from voting on items where they have a conflict of interest (perceived or actual).

Requiring the County check register to be "online" so the public can see where their tax money is being spent.

Agenda items and all documents associated with those agenda items that are given to Commissioners must be made available for citizens to view online at least five business days prior to any meeting.

The Charter Commission will decide how often they should meet to ensure the Charter is completed in the nine months allotted to do the job. I would expect them to break up into small groups that meet a least once a week; and, then have a full Charter Commission meeting once a

month to vote on what gets included in the Charter. Once the final Charter is complete they will submit it to all voters' in a referendum for approval. If approved, it becomes law. If it is not approved, it dies and can only be resurrected by going through the entire process again. Again, the Loudon County Charter will be created by 21 elected Home Rule Charter Commissioners. These 21 citizens will have a unique opportunity to help make county government a better servant of its citizens in many regards. Who doesn't want a more open and efficient local government that hires the most qualified candidates? What suggestions do you have for the future Charter Commissioners? 


