Philly man charged with rape of a child

A Philadelphia man has been charged with rape of a child after an investigation conducted by the Loudon County Sheriff's Office in conjunction with the Child Advocacy Center showed evidence the man had been in sexual contact with a five year old child.

The man in an interview with authorities also admitted to the crime. Investigator Jason Smith, LCSO CID handled the investigation and filed the charges in the crime.




sa Dahlin-Brown for a look at The Death and Life of the Great American School System: How testing and choice are undermining education by Diane Ravitch on Wednesday, May 15, 12:00 p.m. in the East Tennessee History Center auditorium, at 601 South Gay Street, in this month's Books Sandwiched In series, co-sponsored by Knox County Public Library and the City

of Knoxville.

"This book looks at education reform efforts over the last few decades and the author's evolving opinion regarding this reform," Dahlin-Brown says. "Dr. Ravitch has come full circle from one embracing No Child Left Behind to one questioning whether this is the right way to go."

In The Death and Life of the Great American School System, former assistant secre-

tary of education and a leader in the drive to create a national curriculum, Diane Ravitch examines her career in education reform and repudiates positions that she once staunchly advocated. Drawing on over forty years of research and experience, Ravitch critiques today's most popular ideas for restructuring schools, including privatization, standardized testing, punitive accountability, and the feckless multiplication of charter schools. She shows conclusively why the business model is not an appropriate way to improve schools. Using examples from major cities like New York, Philadelphia, Chicago, Denver, and San Diego, Ravitch makes the case that public education today is in peril.

"Join me and let's discuss the book, what we can learn from it and what we feel from our own readings, our own experiences, what might add to the education discussion for the Knoxville region," Dahlin-Brown says. "Are we on the right track or not? Is testing the answer? Are charter schools or vouchers the answer? What about community schools? Join me and let's share and discuss as we learn from one another and this reading."

The public is invited to join the conversation. Bring your favorite sandwich or pick up something from a downtown restaurant. Copies of the books are available at the Library if you'd like to read one before the program.

The series will continue on June 19, when Knoxville News Sentinel Editor Jack McElroy discusses Collapse: How societies choose to fail or succeed by Jared Diamond.

within its lane of travel. The trooper followed the vehicle for about 3 miles and observed it cross the fog line three times as well as unable to maintain a constant speed.
