this chip are known as EMV cards, as well as "chip-andsignature," "chip-and-pin," or "smart" cards. The name "EMV" refers to the three originators of chip-enabled cards: Europay, Master-Card, and Visa. EMV chips are now the global standard for credit card security.

traditional With credit cards, the magnetic strip on the back of the card contains static personal information about the cardholder. This information is used to authenticate the card at the point of sale (PoS) terminal, before the purchase is authorized. When a consumer uses an EMV card at a chip PoS terminal, that transaction is protected using the technology in the microchip. Additionally, consumers will be able to continue to use the magnetic strip on the EMV card at retailers who have not yet implemented chip PoS terminals. When the card is equipped with a personal identification number (PIN), which is known only to the cardholder and the issuing financial institution, issuers will be able to verify the user's identity. Currently, not all EMV cards are issued to consumers with the PIN capability and not all merchant PoS terminals can accept PIN bank.

THREAT

Although EMV cards provide greater security than traditional magnetic strip

entry. EMV transactions at chip PoS terminals provide more security of consumers' personal data than magnetic strip PoS transactions. In addition, EMV card transactions transmit data between the merchant and the issuing bank with a special code that is unique to each individual transaction. This provides the cardholder greater security and makes the EMV card less vulnerable to criminal activity while the data is transmitted from the chip enabled PoS to the issuing



Mark Stephens to discuss Just Mercy: A Story of Justice and Redemption

Join us on October 28 for Books Sandwiched In at the East Tennessee History Center

Justice in America has been called into question with regular reports of false convictions, racial bias in the judicial system, and severe sentencing for drug-related

crimes. Attorney and activist Bryan Stevenson challenged the status quo, taking extreme measures to get justice for clients. Join Mark Stephens, Knox Coun-Public Defender, for a consideration of Stevenson's NY times best selling book Just Mercy: A Story of Justice and Redemption, at noon on Wednesday, October 28 in the East Tennessee History Center auditorium, at this month's Books Sandwiched In, a program series of Knox County Public Library, sponsored by the Friends of Knox County Public Library.

Mr. Stevenson's book is a powerful true story of his coming of age as a young attorney who learns firsthand of the inequities in the American justice system. Stevenson founded the Equal Justice Initiative in Montgomery, Alabama where he seeks relief for condemned prisoners on death row and challenges bias against people of color and against the poor. He is particularly passionate about legal issues and children. He has argued before the Supreme Court five times. He has received numerous awards, including the MacArthur Foundation "Genius" Grant and the Andrew Carnegie Award for Excellence in Non-Fiction for 2015.

One of his first cases was that of Walter Mc-Millian, a young man who was sentenced to die for a notorious murder he insisted he didn't commit. The case drew

Consumers should also shield the keypad from bystanders when entering a PIN, as PINs are vulnerable to cybercriminals who work to steal these numbers to commit ATM and cash-back crimes.

The FBI encourages merchants to handle the EMV card and its data with the same security precautions they use for standard credit cards. Merchants handling sales over the telephone or via the Internet are encouraged to adopt additional security measures to ensure the authenticity of cards used for transac-

tions. At a minimum, protected by the retailmerchants should use and secure servers payment links for all transactions Internet with credit and debit cards, and information should be encrypted, if been a victim of credit possible, to avert hackers from compromising card information provided by consumers.
