
Obituaries





in a commercial sex act. However, the client turned out to be an undercover police officer, and the encounter resulted in Farmer's arrest and prosecution. Upon his arrest, police officers recovered a second minor with Farmer. Farmer's co-defendant is scheduled for sentencing in March 2016.

results for participating high schools with data from the two years before the pilot began.

The pilot program's goals were to increase enrollment, course participation, exam and exam success.

The study found that student enrollment was lower in the AP courswhen compared with the two years preceding the pilot, but

students chose to take AP exams in these courses. The percentage of students who passed the exams declined, though the number of exams with passing scores was slightly higher.

The state pilot proalso included money to pay for In-Certification dustry fees, however the Comptroller's Office could not draw

conclusions because of issues with the program's structure and available data, among other factors.

In addition to an analysis of the pilot program's outcomes, the report provides state lawmakers with policy considerations.
