

Y-12 Breach Leads to Reporter's Study

In July 2012 a house painter, a Vietnam veteran, and an 82-yearold Catholic nun broke into Oak Ridge's Y-12 National Security Complex. Focusing on that event, Washington Post reporter Dan Zak has re-examined the 70-year history of the nation's nuclear weapons program. On August 4, Zak will be in Knoxville to talk about his new book, Almighty: Courage, Resistance, and Existential Peril in the Nuclear Age (Blue Rider Press,

Former Town of Mason Employee Indicted for Theft

The Town of Mason's former public works superintendent, Christopher Lee Trimble, has been indicted by the Tipton County Grand Jury for offimisconduct and \$60,000 theft over after investigation by the Tennessee Comptroller's Office in conjunction with

the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation.

From January 2007 through his resignation in March 2015, Trimble received unauthorized compensation of \$602,865.40. This money included overtime payments, sale of his vacation and sick time back to the town, and unauthorized holi-

day pay.

During this period, Trimble often claimed that he was working 112 hours per week, and indicated that he never took vacation or sick days. The former and current Board of Mayor and Aldermen told investigators they were unaware of the overtime that Trimble claimed, and time sheets made available for inspection were not signed by the mayor or a designated alderman. Trimble admitted to investigators that he did not work all of the hours claimed on his time sheets.

Investigators also raised concerns about payments made to an outside consultant that were never approved by the Board of Mayor and Alderman.

The investigative report also describes numerous deficiencies in the Town of Mason's accounting practices. These include failing to maintain current records, failing to make prompt deposits, and filing delinquent taxes with the Internal Revenue Service.

"This investigation underscores the importance of oversight," said Comptroller Justin P. Wilson. "At a minimum, all employ-
