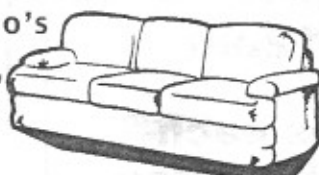

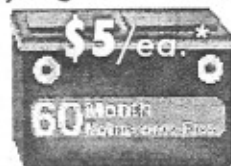

At the Oct. 4, County Board of Education (BOE) meeting, Chairman Bobby Johnson, Jr., said that he and Director Edward Headlee met with Mayor Doyle Arp to discuss various matters. Chairman Johnson hand carried the mayor's message to the BOE. Arp wants the BOE to consider moving the administrative offices out of the county office building to the Tech Center on Harrison Rd. The mayor wants the whole building, Johnson said.

Director Headlee said that if a decision was reached to relocate administrative offices, Mayor Arp felt that renovations should be paid for by a General Bond Issue rather than Education Bonds.

Loudon County property owners will pay for it anyway you look at it! General Bonds are payable from unlimited ad valorem taxes to be levied on all taxable properties. Property taxes are a major source of revenue.

Lets get our priorities straight. How can the BOE even

consider spending money or sitting in new comfortable administrative offices while students try to learn in an environment that is not conducive to learning? Loudon High continues to face serious issues and another possible closing if necessary life safety repairs are not completed by an upcoming deadline and to the satisfaction of the State Fire Marshall. What about the press coverage concerning the deplorable conditions at the Greenback School, created by years of neglect by county government?

The mayor is not content with splurging \$200,000 on his new office renovations including new furniture. Now he wants to spend more taxpayer monies, compliments of the hard work and sweat of the people. All but forgotten are the seniors on fixed income having to bear the burden of more out of control spending and likely higher taxes, for the follies of elected officials?

What's more important the mayor's needs or children's needs? Please voice your concerns to commissioners and county BOE members; action will be taken on Nov. 1 by the BOE.

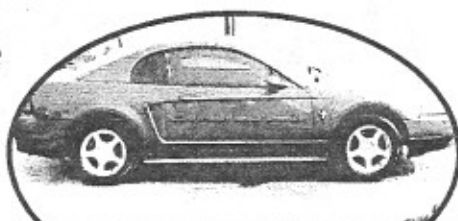

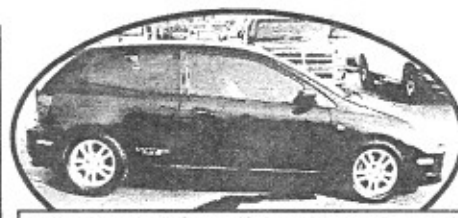

Melt In Your Mouth Pumpkin Bread

Prep time: 15 min.

Cook time: 1 hr.

Original recipe yield: 2 - 9x5 inch loaves

2 C. all-purpose flour

2 C. white sugar

2 (3.5 oz.) packages instant coconut cream

pudding mix

1 tsp. baking soda

1 tsp. salt

1 tsp. ground cinnamon

1 1/4 C. vegetable oil

5 eggs

2 C. canned pumpkin

puree

1. Preheat oven to 325

degrees F (165 degrees

C). Lightly grease two

9x5 inch loaf pans.

2. In a large bowl, com-

bine flour, sugar, pudding

mix, baking soda, salt

and cinnamon. Stir in the

oil, eggs and pumpkin

until just blended.. Stir

the flour mixture into the

egg mixture. Pour batter

into prepared pans.

3. Bake in preheated

oven for 1 hour, or until

a toothpick inserted into center of the loaf comes out clean. Remove from oven and let stand 15 minutes, then remove from pans and cool on wire rack.
