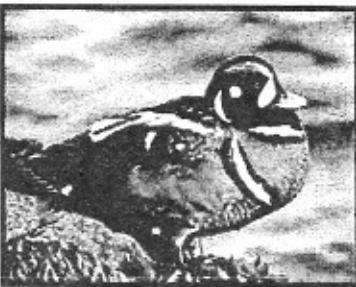

Tennessee has been involved in the project since 1995. Florida piloted the first local contest in 1989. Soon, other states were following the example. The program grew rapidly, and now all states and the District of Columbia participate.

The first time a sheet of Federal Junior Duck stamps was printed was in 1992, and it included nine state "Best of Show" winners from 1991 and 1992. After that, a national competition was instituted, with the top winning art printed as a stamp and sold to raise funds for conservation education.

In Tennessee, the program began with the help of partners such as the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency, the Tennessee Wildlife Federation (then called the Tennessee Conservation League) and generous help from individuals such as Mrs. Jeanette Rudy.

The program has now blossomed to attracting the top student waterfowl artists and provides a prestigious awards ceremony for the top 100 winning students at the Opryland Hotel in Nashville.

The TWRA will take the "Tennessee Best of Show" winning artwork and produce a state waterfowl stamp

sold for conservation education. The winner of the Best of Show receives a \$500 award.

All entries for the Tennessee art competition are due on March 15 each year. Please keep in mind two key rules. First, the species of waterfowl you draw must be a native North American duck, goose, or swan. Second, all entries must be drawn horizontally and be nine inches high by 12 inches wide.

Soon after the annual entry deadline, the artwork is judged by a panel of experts. The judges change each year, but the panel typically includes a combination of waterfowl biologists, artists, and natural resource professionals. The art is separated into four grade groups (K-3, 4-6, 7-9, and 10-12), and each group is judged independently. Once the first place winners for each group have been selected, they are viewed again to select a single Best of Show for the state.

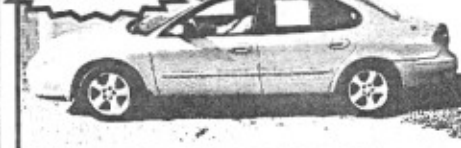

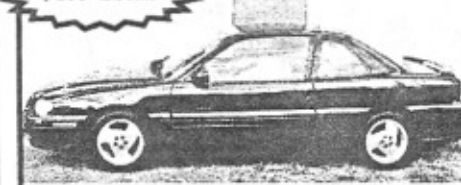

mous in the subcontinent but the west is unaware of her extraordinary life," says the author. J A Joshi traveled extensively in North India in her research for the book where she realized

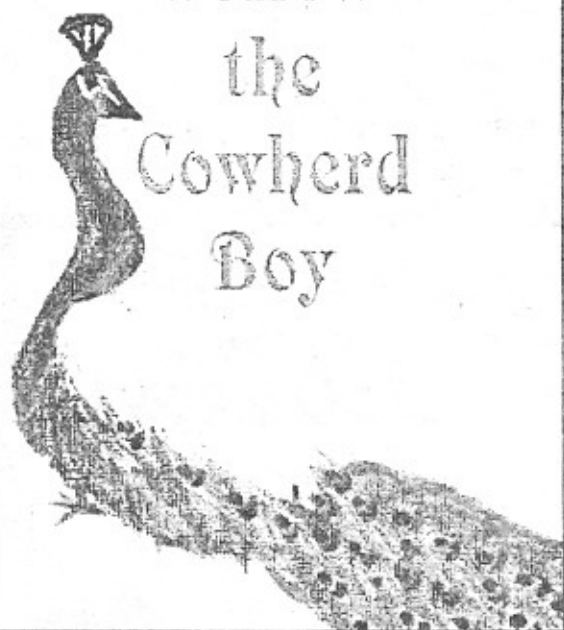
that the themes of the book—history, culture, terrorism, and spirituality—make this story relevant to the modern reader. She completed the novel in 2002 when she was 22 years

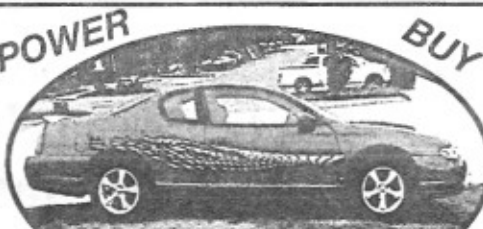

Troopers ride school buses to ensure children stay safe

Nashville, - The Tennessee Department of Safety and the Tennessee Highway Patrol are participating in National School Bus Safety Week, October 22-26, 2007. This year's theme, "Be Aware! Cross with Care," reminds children in Tennessee who ride a school bus to always cross in front of the bus and to look both ways before crossing the street.

"School buses safely transport nearly 25-million kids to and from school everyday, more than 500-thousand right here in Tennessee," stated Commissioner David Mitchell. "That's 500-thousand precious reasons motorists need to be alert and stop for stopped school buses."

Troopers have written

a total of 1,197 citations to drivers since August 1, 2007, as part of THP's Safe Schools Enforcement Campaign. More than 300 of those drivers were ticketed for speeding in a school zone. Last year, Troopers issued nearly 6,500 citations in school zones across the state.

"Our school bus drivers are doing a great job keeping children safe, but they need the help of other motorists," said Colonel Mike Walker. "Our goal is to make sure children get to school and back home safely. That's why Troopers enforce traffic laws, train school bus drivers and inspect buses."

More than 11-thousand school bus drivers were trained last year

by the Department of Safety. Troopers also inspected 9,988 school buses.

The THP plans to increase its presence in school zones throughout the state during School Bus Safety Week. In some counties, Troopers will ride buses, as well as follow school buses in marked patrol units, looking for drivers who ignore the red flashing lights and pass school buses that are stopped to load or unload children.

"Drivers need to know that a school zone isn't just the 15-mile-per-hour area around a school. It's anywhere children travel," Colonel Walker added. "This effort is very important to us because many of us are parents and grandparents."
