"We will follow the IRS's lead in regard to the April 17 filing deadline. As always, we encourage taxpayers to utilize our online tax filing applications," said Revenue Commissioner Reagan Farr.

The Department of Revenue is responsible for the administration of state tax laws and motor vehicle title and registration laws established by the legislature and the collection of taxes and fees associat-

ed with those laws. The Department of Revenue collects approximately 92 percent of total state tax revenue. During the 2005-2006 fiscal year, the department collected \$10.3 billion in state taxes and fees. In addition to collecting state taxes, \$1.8 billion of local sales tax was collected by the department for local governments during the 2005-2006 fiscal year. Besides collecting taxes, the department enforces the revenue laws fairly and impartially in an effort to encourage voluntary taxpayer compliance. The department also apportions revenue collections for distribution to the various state

LCSD Deputy TJ Scarbrough reported that officers and deputies were not able to locate the runner, but a few short hours later, calls started coming into dispatch in reference to a barefoot man knocking on doors and asking to use the phone. Deputy Scarbrough reported that during the foot chase the runner had run out of his shoes, but continued to run.

When officers arrived at the location where the emergency calls were coming from a homeowner told them the barefoot man just rounded the corner when he saw law enforcement coming.

The runner was reported to have gone to the Loudon Fence Company to use the phone where officials finally captured him behind the fence company.

The runner was identified as Don Bruce Arrington, 25, Waltham Lane, Oak Ridge, who was charged with evading arrest.

The driver Brian Bruce King, Little Dog Wood Road, Kingston, was charged with driving on suspended 1st offense.

LCSD Deputies Chris Jenkins, TJ Scarbrough, SGT. Billy Hall and K-9 partner Draga, and Deputy Marty Stanley all helped to apprehend the barefoot runner.

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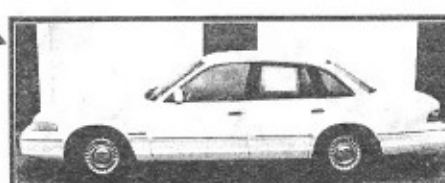
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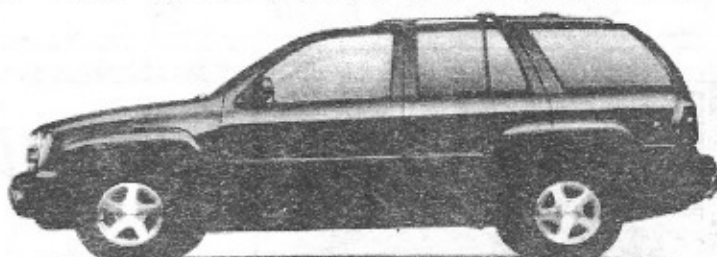
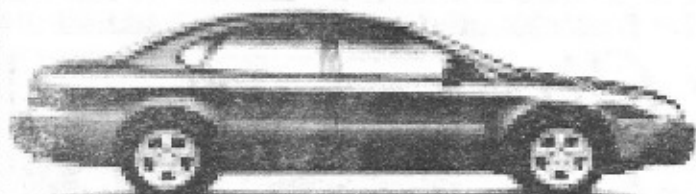
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
