



As the officer was talking to him Officer Sam Harrison walked up to the passenger side of the vehicle and observed a small silver handgun and what appeared to be two plastic baggies containing a white, rock-like substance believed to be crack cocaine in plain view in the passenger side floorboard.

The officer identified the driver as Esley Clemons Jr. and during a search of the whicle officer found in the dassenger side arm rest a lastic baggie containing small amount of a green cafy substance believed to marijuana. After closer spection it was learned ne larger of the two baggies containing suspected crack cocaine actually contained some type of counterfeit controlled substance most likely soap or deoderant. The substance in the smaller paggie tested positive for cocaine.

A check of Clemons crimitial history showed him to have previous felony convictions for felony drug crimes and crimes involving violence.

Mr. Clemons was found to have a friend who had walked into a store. A check of the area found Gary Montgomery at a nearby hotel. Mr. Montgomery had an active warrant for his arrest out of Knoxville. He was transported back to the scene where he was identified by Clemons as the friend. A search of the vehicle produced drugs and a loaded handgun along with a set of digital scales. Gary Montgomery was checked through NCIC and found to have an extensive criminal

history including several felonly drug charges/convictions.

issues even further, the company sent letters to its employees dated Feb.6, 2007 stating they were welcome to return to work by Feb. 8, 2007 for their scheduled shifts or the company would begin to hire what it called "permanent replacements." According to several union members these letters weren't sent by certified mail until Feb. 7, 2007 and weren't received until Feb. 8, 2007 after the deadline to report to work. In the letter it states that once replaced, that employee, would be eligible to be

placed on a "preferential re-employment list" for what the company calls a "reasonable amount of time".

According to a press release issued by the company they, (Maremont), have stated the reasons behind the recent decrease in benefits is directly due to increased competition with offshore companies who are not required to provide their employees with workers compensation. healthcare or retirement benefits and only have to pay \$2.00 /hr or less

The company also states that Loudon employees deserve a salary that creates a successful quality of life and health care benefits that ensure their families' needs. The company also states they welcome the employees back to work.

The Union employees however, are not satisfied with the company implementing another substantial increase in the insurance premiums thus costing them



The fake lottery corporation wants you to send them money from the check that they have enclosed with vour lottery letter to receive payment of \$2000 to over \$10000 or more. They want you to cash the check and

then send them the cash by using Western Union. The place being sent to is Nigeria. Canada or other foreign places. When you sent the cash, that is the last you hear from them. The case will not be prosecuted by the Postal Service because of the location of the suspects. Also because the addresses and phone numbers they

use are not real. Sometimes you can get them on the phone, but most of the time the number comes up being disconnected.

If you cash the check, the bank will hold you personally responsible for the amount and may try to prosecute you.




