A Loudon woman was caught with several pills and jailed after she nearly hit a LPD Officer head-on and she was found in possession of numerous pills.

According to the report, Officer Jonathan Yates, LPD was on routine patrol when he

was almost hit head-on by a red Saturn. Officer Yates reported he turned around and the Saturn was still in the opposite lane of travel. Once the officer had the Saturn stopped in the Kwik Pantry parking lot, the driver was identified as Carol Leann Shirk,

have had a lethargic demeanor, and gave LPD Sgt. Brian Jenkins consent to search her vehicle.

While searching the vehicle, a black film container was found that reportedly held two purple and white

capsules believed to be morphine, 6 half white pills believed to be Xanax, and one blue pill believed to be Valium. Shirk could provide no prescriptions for the pills and was taken to Loudon County Jail where she attempted to hide more pills in her pocket, but was caught by jailers.

Discovered in Shirk's pocket were two plastic bags, one containing 26 white pills identical to the ones (Xanax) found during the traffic stop, along with one white pill believed to be Methadone. The other bag contained seven purple and white capsules also identical to the ones (Morphine) found in the traffic stop.

Officer Yates charged Carol Leann Shirk, 36, Grimes Road Loudon with possession of schedule IV (Valium), possession of schedule IV (Xanax) for resale, possession of schedule II (Morphine) for resale, and possession of schedule II (Methadone).

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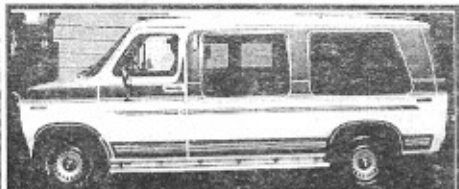

that her boyfriend, Mark Anthony Stevens, pulled a knife on her, told her he would kill her, cut her panties off, choked her leaving red marks on her neck and face, then told her if she tried to leave he would kill her. He then started ramming her head and body into the walls while still holding the knife on her.

Later, at Fort Sanders Hospital, Sgt. David Flynn, LCPD reported that Stevens was at the hospital and was told several times to stand up and place his hands behind his back, that he was under arrest on an aggravated assault warrant stemming from the knife attack on his girlfriend. After Stevens refused several commands given by Sgt. Flynn, the sergeant stated he called for backup which

consisted of LCPD Officers Mike Hodges and Jeremy Dishner, who told Stevens several more times that he was under arrest, to stand up and comply with the commands.

Stevens still refused and Sgt. Flynn attempted to put Stevens' hands behind his back and Stevens' reportedly struggled and attempted to pull away from officers. Stevens was reported to have kept struggling while being taken to the police cruiser where he was finally taken into custody.

Stevens, 35, of Simpson Street, Loudon, was charged with aggravated assault.

had had to drink, it was reported he replied in slurred speech "too much." Sgt. Jenkins made the arrest.

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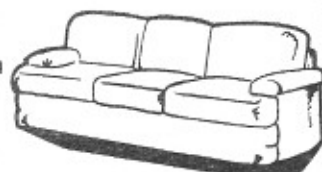
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Letter to the Editor

On Tuesday, February 27, 2007, Kristi came into Lake Country Market on Beal's Chapel Road and bought a pack of Camel Lights buy one get one free, which cost \$4.15 plus tax, which comes to \$4.52. She gave me a ten dollar bill and I gave her \$5.48 back in change. Thirty minutes later she came back and said I didn't give her back any change because she didn't have any one dollar bills. I told her I gave her a five dollar bill and some change so she wouldn't have any ones. I told her I could go count down the register to make sure, she said no, I didn't have to do that. I went up front and did it anyway. It came up a few cents over. The owner and another employee were standing there and saw this. She was okay with that and left.

ed Trooper Russell Smith, THP clocked the duo doing 82 in a 65 and when he pulled the vehicle over he smelled a strong odor of marijuana. Both the driver, Robert A. Webb and the passenger, Chancey J. Hunsucker, admitted to smoking weed an hour prior to the traffic stop.

Webb was reported

have been unsteady on his feet, seemed confused, and failed to perform field sobriety tests to satisfaction.

During the consented search of the Ford Explorer the two were traveling in, 27 grams of marijuana was found in the console in a cup along with two rolled joints in a pack of cigarettes. Hunsucker reportedly

admitted to buying the weed in Florida.

Chancey J. Hunsucker, 28, Guest River Road, Norton, Virginia, was charged with possession of schedule VI for resale, and possession of

The paraphernalia charge came when Hunsucker was taken to Loudon County Jail where a pack of rolling papers was found in his wallet. Tennessee State Trooper Russell Smith made the arrest.

No evidence was found to be processed on the items.

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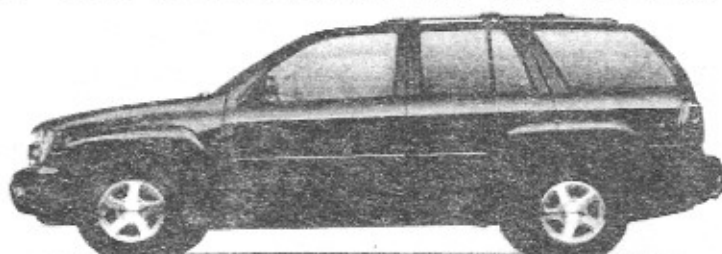
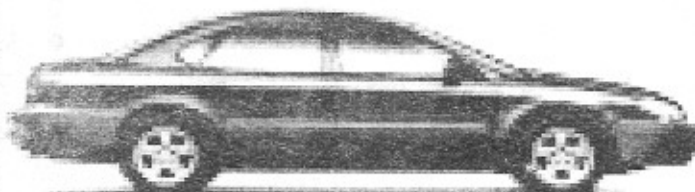
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
