the vehicle Torres was driving and discovered he did not have a license, issued a warning for speeding and charged Torres with driving without a license.



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

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

Burchfield identified a possible suspect to police and valued the loss at around \$50.

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
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Bomb Threat

North Middle School was evacuated and Eaton Elementary was placed on lock down Tuesday afternoon after the Lenoir City Police Department, Loudon County Sheriff's Department, Lenoir City Fire Department and Rural Metro EMS responded to a bomb threat at the middle school. At approximately 1:50 p.m. a call was placed to the rescue agencies stating that threats had been placed against the school.

A perimeter was quickly established around both schools and all traffic into the facilities was quickly shut down as the rescue workers took control of the scene. Officials including Detectives Patrick Upton and Chris White, LCSD, immediately began a sweep of the premises.

According to sources close to the scene, a threat was found written on a boy's restroom wall, which was accompanied by a note that stated that there was a bomb, along with a weapon, that had been left in the facility. The statement was later verified by Assistant Chief Deputy Jimmy Davis.

The NMS students were evacuated to the track behind Eaton Elementary, which had been placed on what authorities called a "soft lock down."

The Knox County Sheriff's Department was called in to assist in the clearing of the school with their bomb-detecting canines.

Worried parents quickly gathered outside the school to await news of their children and of the situation in general, however information was scarce until the Assistant Director of Schools, Howard Luttrell addressed the concerned crowd.

"Everyone is safe. There may have been a threat made and we

are trying to clear the building as quickly as possible. As soon as we receive the clearance, we will start releasing the students," stated Mr. Luttrell, who arrived at the location within minutes of the call.

The NMS students seemed to handle the event relatively unphased. They spent the afternoon enjoying the sunshine on the track behind Eaton Elementary. NMS teacher Amanda Kriger said, "You never want this to happen (bomb threat), but our students are behaving wonderfully."

As usual, the staff and students of NMS, along with the rescue workers who responded to the scene, were able to handle one of the most serious situations that can arise at any public facility with swift, decisive decision-making and a professionalism that is matched by

No injuries were reported and the investigation was continuing.

ty Daniel Kelly, LCSD, responded to a Vonnore Road residence where he spoke with Ronald Tutterow who advised his child was playing in the yard and was running when he fell and was attacked by two Rottweillers.

Tutterow advised the dogs jumped on the downed child and began biting him on his right arm and lacerating his back.

The child, whose age as not listed, was taken by EMS to Ft. Loudon Medical Center before his car alarm began sounding.

Jack Norman of Ohio told Deputy T.J. Scarbrough, LCSD, he was visiting his mother at her Avery Circle residence and just before 2:00 a.m. he thought he heard something outside and moments later his car alarm started sounding.

Norman reportedly advised nothing was taken and no vandalism had taken place, but he wanted to report the incident to police.

Reginald D. Harmon, 36, of Doug-


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

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
