Union member responds

Dear Editor,

First I want to Thank You to our town for all their support. Your food, prayers, and kind words have been greatly appreciated these past 6 weeks, since we went on strike. Mr. Banks issued a paid advertisement trying to make the community think that the strikers at Maremont are a bunch of low life thugs. This could not be further from the truth. The people who were employed at Maremont Until February 5, 2007, are a bunch of honest, hard working, Christian ocaple from all over rina area. Most os us are older citizens who have worked most of our lives in this factory. We have raised our children, by working long, hard hours in this

plant, Our children and other family members also worked at Maremont, Kenneth Banks doesn't even live in our community. If he really cared about our town and its people, we would be talking and not still on the street.

On March 5, 2006, Mr. Kenneth Banks purchased Maremont from Arvin Meritor. Since then, things have gone downhill. He fired people for taking a break. He laid off many good salary people and brought in new people for less wages. The plant has been in Loudon for 38 years and until Banks bought the plant, we have not had any problems.

On Feb. 5, 2007, the Union and Mr. Banks could not reach and agreement on a contract. The Union chose to accept his final offer

on insurance: which was to be \$292 for a family plan with no wage increase. In Dec. 2006, I was paying \$92 a month. He already raised insurance in Jan. 2007. He wanted to double dip in Feb. Besides the insurance issue, he insisted on hiring new employees @ \$9.25 with no automatic increases. But the issue that bothers me the most is that he didn't want to recall any of the 56 people that were laid off. We fought for those people. Now some of those same people are crossing our picket line and taking our jobs.

These people are accusing us of things that we have not done. My son, (Shawn Bivens), did not throw a rock. He wasn't even in the area. After he was accused, slandered and blasted over the paper and the news, he was

found NOT Guilty. Mr. Banks still seems to be accusing him. The house fire was not ruled arson. Why would we set anyone's house on fire? Especially a salary person, they aren't taking our jobs. How do you know that one of the scabs; inside the plant, didn't call a bomb threat in? Sixty hours a week will soon wear you down. If they have proof of any of the claims, why are they not pressing charges? I am not in favor of violence, but I do know how it feels to watch 200 people cross the picket line and take our jobs.

Over 200 of use are on the street with no income or insurance. What are we expected to do? Should we smile. wave, and thank the scabs for taking our jobs? Should we thank Purdy Trucking Company for not supporting us? We only want Mr.

Banks to help pay for our insurance. We offered to extend the old contract to another year so the plant could get on its feet, but Banks chose not to accept it. He is trying to break the union. He has no intention of bargaining in good faith with the union. He needs to realize that his best people and lots of experience are on the street.

Everything that happens in East Tennessee is not committed by the Union.

Mr. Banks, his guards and high priced lawyers are trying to make us look like Terrorists! He could have paid our insurance IN FULL with the money he has spent on pay for the guards that he has hired to watch us, and the million bucks he has contributed to the Quarter Horse Foundation.

Union responds to ad

The International Association of Machinists and Aerospace Workers Lecal 2545 believes in and encourages our members to abide by the local, state, and federal laws.

The accusations of drive-by shootings, vandalism of vehicles, homes and the electrical transformer have not been proven in a court of law as being committed by a member of the Machinists Union. The case heard by Chancellor Frank Williams III, involved a female Maremont employee accusing

a union member of throwing a rock at her car. Chancellor Williams dismissed the charges against the union member due to lack of evidence. Let's not forget to mention that no evidence of arson has been found in relation to the house fire of a salaried employee.

In the March 12th issue of the Daily Edition {eds. note: a paid advertisement from an advertising agency out of Nashville for the Maremont Corporation ran} in that ad, Mr. Banks is quoted as saying "Maremont offers a better hourly wage than most Ten-

nessee jobs...and we offer good benefits. including our latest offer of 78% premium coverage for health benefits and a 401k retirement plan." There were several things he failed to mention in his paid advertisement. Mr. Banks wants to significantly cut wages, shift the cost of health care benefits so the hourly employees will pay a larger percentage of insurance premiums, plus he wants to reduce seniority retention for those employees that have or will be laid off from Maremont, Our wages & benefits are less than many other manufacturers in the

area, such as Viscase, Staley's, Kimberly Clark and Denso.

The members of local 2545 are law-abiding. hard working people who only seek to earn a living wage, have affordable health care and benefits that are comparable to other local employers. Our wages benefit not only our immediate family, but our community, state and country in the form of taxes and as consumers of goods and services provided by businesses. In seeking to cut employees take home pay, Mr. Banks seeks to reduce the amount of expendable income of his employees and thereby adversely affects the "bottom line" of area businesses. He also seeks to set a precedent for other companies to follow in lowering wages and benefits.

Mr. Banks says, "we have lost money every month since we bought the plant last March, and had hoped to turn the corner soon. But we need a good safe work environment for our workers and community support for public safety in order to remain a business resource in Loudon." One wonders how you can improve safety and produce a quality product by hiring inexperienced people to replace the seasoned hourly workers who make up the majority of Local 2545.

Mr. Banks, do you really think that the offer you are making to the union is going to support the community as a whole? When wages or benefits are cut, there is less money supporting the community. It is in the best interest of Loudon County that you negotiate in good faith with the union to provide a contract that is fair & profitable for the community.




