Maremont strike violence escalates

Violence since the strike began at Maremont Corp. continues to escalate. Two employees of Maremont have recently reported shots being fired at their homes. Both men are relatives of Loudon County Deputy Jerry Rabern and one incident happened at the deputies home just a few feet from his Loudon County patrol car.

On Sunday night the home of Glenn Johnson who is the brother in law of Deputy Jerry Rabern was shot into. According to the report, Deputy Chris Jenkins spoke to Mr. Johnson and other relatives in the residence that around

10pm they heard the glass break in the living room. The victim also reported when hearing the breakage he thought he was a flash outside the residence. Also on arrival the officer observed a break in the living room window to what appeared to be done by a gunshot. The gunshot went through a double pained window and the bullet was found behind the sofa under the window. Also there have been several incidents at the residence involving a gunshot into a truck. Also on leaving the driveway there were several bent nails in the driveway.

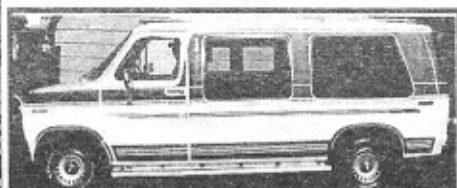

Residence

According to reports, Sharon Barrone, Flatwoods Road, advised someone entered her home and stole several pieces of jewelry and two boxes of change.

Deputy Crag Brewer, LCSD, responded to the call and reported entry had been made through a bedroom window. He left a lost listing form with Barrone so she and her husband could go through the house to determine what else may be missing.

On Monday morning the son of Deputy Rabern, Jeffrey discovered his vehicle shot into. The rear window

was out of his 1999 Dodge truck at it was parked in the driveway. Only 2 vehicles over was Deputy Rabern's cruiser. Deputy Jake Keener, LCSD reported the window was struck by a small caliber round that entered the cab of the truck but did not exit. The officer was unable to locate the round or a shell casing from the incident. Deputy Rabern reported he heard a motorcycle about 11pm the night before and believes that is when the incident occurred. The estimated damage is over \$400.

Investigators report they believe the incidents are related due to the fact both men are working at the Maremont plant and believe these incidents are related

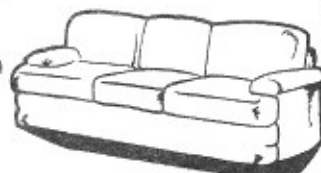

to other acts of vandalism against Maremont employees.

On Monday afternoon three Local IAM 2545 members on the picket line in front of the plant reported a Loudon County Sheriff's Deputy had threatened them. In statements from Joe Finger, Elmer Collier and Jerry Smith they reported Deputy Jerry Rabern came up in his patrol car and the first thing he said was "I hope you never get your jobs back. He said someone shot into his house and they told him they knew nothing about the incidents." The statements also state "He (Rabern) said if any union member came to his house

shooting again they would be shot."

In a statement from Deputy Jerry Rabern on the incident, "I, Jerry Rabern, did drive my Sheriff's cruiser to the justice center and pick up two reports to take to the Maremont plant in Loudon for my son Jeffrey and my brother in law Glen Johnson Jr.; both had shots fired into their home or vehicle. I picked up the reports and took them to the main gate. While at the Maremont plant the guard asked if I could get a tag number off a bus parked in the field near the plant. I did drive to the bus and wrote down the tag number and took it back to the guard. As I was driving back in one of the picketers called to me that

my son should not be crossing picket lines and I responded with I don't care if you ever get your jobs back. As I was leaving the picketer came to my car and said that what I said was uncalled for being that I didn't know him. I told him he was correct and that I was just mad over what had happened and I told him and the other two men that I apologize for what I had said. I told them that someone had shot into my son's truck and into my brother in laws home. They told me they hadn't done the shooting and I told them I wasn't blaming them but if I had been outside when the shooter had come by I would have shot them and if any-

one comes back to do more damage I will not hesitate to shoot anyone attempting to shoot at my family or property. The men all agreed that the shooting was uncalled for. I told them again that I apologize for what I had said and told them I hoped everything could be worked out for them. At that time I left the area and returned home."

Sheriff Tim Guider stated "in all three statements and the report it stated that if someone came back on Officer Rabern's property he would shoot or shoot back. The rumors of him threatening to shoot anybody and everybody are unfounded.

In the officers statement he said he would defend his family and property from any future incident, which any person would do. I must take into consideration that these incidents occurred and his comments obviously were triggered by threats to his family and property and that while it is admitted officer Rabern's comments were not well taken even the most prudent person can understand his frustrations"

The strike continues and District Attorney General Russell Johnson along with Sheriff Tim Guider, Chief Bear Webb and Chief Don White are working to attain a solution to the strike violence.

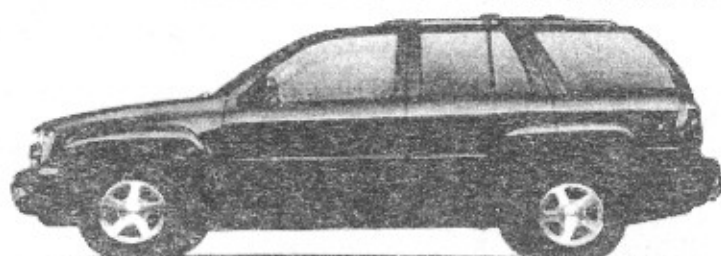
