

local man called authorities to a Loudon County location Saturday to investigate the theft of electrical wiring taken from a home under construction.

Deputy Dewayne Drinnen, LCSD, reported he was dis-

patched to a home under construction along Saligugi Way where he spoke with Danny Moon of Lenoir City. Moon told him he is not the builder, but is helping the owners, Jerry and Nell Browning of Knoxville, supervise with the building of their home. They had fired the builder and continued with construction.

Moon reportedly advised that during the time the insulation crew was in the house someone cut the copper wiring from most of the structure. The wire was cut in the rafters and pulled down, and in the basement, which had 12' ceilings, the wire was cut up next to the joist. No ladders were in the house at the time.

Moon identified the insulation and electrical companies working on the home and advised there had been only one problem crew and they were the framers.

The framers were

working three houses down from the Browning's and it was reported they had been asked not to come back.

The lawman reported he collected possible evidence at the scene for further processing. The value of the damage was unknown at the time of the report.

On Monday, authorities responded to a Loudon County iob site after a crew arrived at work to find the house had been gutted of its wiring.

Deputy Chris Bowen, LCSD, reported he was dispatched to a location along Washita Lane where he spoke with Doug Euger of Keener Homes. Euger said a crew from Reagan Electrical had left the residence on Friday around 6:00 p.m. and when they returned Monday around noon they discovered the home had been gutted of all electrical

The value of the loss was estimated at \$8000.



throughout the world with a permanent record keeping system that will preserve information on all legally harvested wild turkeys taken in the spirit of fair chase.

Records are kept for Eastern, Florida, Rio Grande, and Merriam's subspecies. The Eastern subspecies is found in Tennessee.

Weight, beard length, and spur length are considered to determine a total score for wild turkeys.

The formula for overall score is: weight (lbs. and oz.) plus 10 times spur length (right plus left) plus 2 times the beard length. The beard must be measured, to the nearest 1/16 inch, from the

center point of the protrusion from the skin to the end of the longest bristle. Spurs must be measured, to the nearest 1/16 inch, along the outside center, from the point at which the spur protrudes from the scaled leg skin to the tip of the spur. Ounces and fractions of inches need to be converted to decimals.

Persons submitting records must be cur-

rent members of the NWTF. Hunters may join when the record is submitted.

# Household Hazardous Waste Mobile Collection Service in Loudon County on Saturday, March 31

On Saturday, March 31, any Tennessee resident may bring their household hazardous waste to the following location.

Loudon County - Loudon County Justice Center from 8:00 a.m. until 1:00 p.m. The local contact for this HHW collection event is Gordon

Harless at (865) 988-0175.

Typical items to dispose of include cleaning fluids, pesticides, mercury thermometers and thermostats, swimming pool chemicals, paints and thinners and automotive fluids. Also accepted are fluorescent bulbs and electronics such as televisions, computer monitors, keyboards, computer mouse devices and computer processing units. Console televisions must be dismantled.

Items not accepted include microwave ovens, ammunition, explosives, medical waste and any items from a school, commercial business or

agri-business.

When transporting materials to the site, place containers in sturdy boxes lined with newspaper to prevent spills and cross-contamination in the trunk of a car or back of a truck, away from children and pets. Materials should be kept in the original container whenever possible. If not, place it in a plastic jug with a secure lid and label the contents.


