



On March 27, 2007 at approximately 8:30 a.m. CDT, Tennessee 511 officially reached 500,000 calls. At this rate, it is possible that the system will receive a million calls within its first year of operation.

"Governor Bredesen and I presented 511 to the public last August, and we are very pleased at the tremendous response from motorists," said Commissioner Nicely. "Motorists are using the 511 system in increasing numbers to get current and accurate information on road conditions in Tennessee."

The Tennessee 511 system is a component of a nationwide plan to provide reliable

traveler information to the motoring public. Tennessee was the 24th state to launch a 511 system since the initiative began in 2000.

Tennessee 511 uses both touch-tone and voice-activated technology. Upon dialing 511, a caller is presented with a list of options that can be accessed either by using their phone keypad or by simply speaking. The available options include current information on traffic conditions, statewide weather information. access to TDOT's Record-A-Comment phone line, Amber Alerts, and links to neighboring state 511 systems.

Judy Steele, TDOT Community Relations Director added, "I am delighted that motorists in Tennessee continue to trust and depend on 511 as a one-stop resource for obtaining accurate statewide travel information. The investment that TDOT made in this technology is paying off by making travel safer and more convenient for Tennessee's drivers."

the participants, reminds the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency (TWRA). Of primary concern is the occasional accident when a turkey hunter does properly identify his or her target. Even one accident is too many. The TWRA encourages all turkey hunters to follow defensive turkey hunting tactics recommended by the National Wild Turkey Federation.

If you plan to hunt wild turkeys in Tennessee this season follow these safety

Select the largest stump, blow-down, tree trunk or rock that is wider than vour shoulders and higher than your head to place your back against when calling:

a hunter is more likely to spot another hunter when moving to the front or side than from behind.

Eliminate the colors white, red, black and blue from your hunting outfit; this includes handkerchiefs, socks, underwear, etc... these are the colors of a turkey gobbler.

Select your calling spot in open timber rather than thick brush; eliminating movement is the key to success, not concealment.

Be discreet when imitating the sound of a gobbling turkey.

A good woodsman can always detect movement in the woods by watching other game or listening for the alarm cries of blue jays, crows, squirrels or woodpeckers. Be alert.

When songbirds, crows or your turkey shuts up, be alert. There's a good chance another hunter may be moving in on the same turkey.

Never move, wave or make turkey sounds to alert another hunter of your presence. Remain still and speak in a loud, clear voice to announce your presence. These tactics are safer than quick movements. Use common sense.




