Officer April Farmer, LPD made the arrest.

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
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

Alert

issued 240 violations involving trenching and excavations, totaling more than \$1

million in penalties. Also three workers have lost their lives since then, due to safety violations.

"Our Tennessee Occupational Safety and Health Division would like to see a decrease in trenching and excavation fatalities and violations," said Commissioner Neely. "When accidents happen in trenching they are usually fatal, and this type of accident can easily be prevented."

The Tennessee Department of Labor & Workforce Development's Occupational Safety and Health division offers the following safety tips to employers and workers:

Where a trench that is to be occupied by a worker is five feet deep or greater:

* The sides of a trench or excavation must be protected from "cave-in" by one of the following: sloping (at the appropriate angle for the soil type); shoring (normally with metal and hydraulic approved equipment); or inserting a trench box in a trench.

* Excavated dirt must not be within two feet of the trench or excavation.

* A "competent person" must be present. This person must know the requirements of the trenching and excavation standards and have the authority to stop and/or make necessary changes in the operation to make it safe.

Under a special emphasis program on trenching and excavation established in 1997 all TOSHA compliance and consultative services personnel are instructed to be on the lookout for trenching or excavation work sites. Trenching and excavation work creates extremely dangerous hazards to workers.

Personal observation, reports of imminent danger, safety and health agency referrals, employee complaints and media reports are utilized to locate trenching and excavation work.

The subjects did trespass onto the property of Tate and Lyle, a fenced property, and entered

through the gate with the intent to deprive the owner of his property. The property taken had a value of \$1000.

Mr. Martinez handed the officer his license the officer noticed his hands trembled. While performing a license check the officer asked Martinez if he was carrying any illegal narcotics or weapons. Martinez told the officer no and asked for consent to search. Martinez told the officer he would rather not "cause I've been through this before"

Officer Jeremy Dishner of LCPD was on scene and performed a scan with K-9 Sting who alerted on the vehicle. A probable cause search was performed which revealed a brown purse sitting in the passenger floorboard which contained a small yellow zip lock bag with

several other bags of a white crystal substance. Officer Dishner also located a brown paper bag, which was lying on the mattress, which contained 2 glass methamphetamine pipes and 2 large containers of empty bags.

A further search of the sleeper area of the truck revealed a nylon bag which contained digital scales, a torch, numerous bags of a white crystal substance and 2 large white bags of a white crystal substance wrapped in black tape. A field test was performed on the powder, which gave a positive result for the presence of

methamphetamine.

Daniel W. Martinez, Jr., 32, of Old Midway Road, Lenoir City, was charged with poss. of sch. II "crystal meth" over 3 oz. less than 5 oz. for resale and unlawful possession of drug paraphernalia.

Jesus Saucedo Cano, 40, of Industrial Park Drive, Lenoir City, was charged with driving without a license.


According to the report, Cano was stopped for a missing taillight and was found to be unlicensed.

Deputy Brad Rayfield, LCSD made the arrest.


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


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
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
