New Healthcare Lottery Available Reverse Lottery met with skepticism

Tennessee's newest lottery is aimed at helping boost the healthcare system with much needed funds following the downsizing of the TennCare program.

The Reverse Lottery. as it is being called, is a first in the history of gambling and opponents say the idea is just plain ridiculous. The rules of the game allow only those whose incomes are in the six-figure range to play. Once the numbers are called, the "winner" must forfeit all their assets to the State of Tennessee. The funds are then pumped into the medical system and will be made available to those whose incomes are \$30,000 per year or less.

"This is just plain stupid," said one citizen, "Why would anyone want to win something when the prize means you lose everything?"

Firehall Island up and running

Sunday, April 1 will be the very first day local firefighters will get to enjoy their new digs in the middle of Tellico Lake. Yes, you read that right, Tellico Lake.

Local planners have been working for months trying to locate a site for the new Lenoir City Fire Department and have settled on an island just south of Tellico Dam.

The bold plan calls for a super-dooper-duty pump to be built underwater around the perimeter of the island and for the City to dispose of all but one fire truck. Instead, firefighters will obtain their pilot's license in order to fly the new

fire fighting helicopters that have been specially designed to carry exceedingly long hoses to wherever needed.

The pump system will allow water to be freely pumped right out of the lake, saving taxpayers hundreds of dollars per year. There will be one three lane

road leading to the island with very strict lane restrictions, limiting civilian travel to only one lane.
