





States unemployment rate for the month of February was 4.5 percent.

County non-seasonally adjusted unemployment rates for February 2007, released today, show that 28 counties increased, 56 counties decreased and 11 remain unchanged.

Williamson County registered the state's lowest county unemployment rate at 3.4 percent, unchanged from 3.4 percent in January. Pickett County was the states highest at 12.0 percent, up from 11.4 in January, followed by Jackson County at 9.3 percent, up from 8.6 in January.

Knox County has the state's lowest maior metropolitan rate at 3.9 percent, which remained unchanged from 3.9 percent in January, Davidson County is 4.2 percent, up from 4.1 in January. Hamilton County is at 4.1 percent, down from 4.4 in January, and Shelby County is 5.6 percent, down from the January rate of 5.7.

The unemloyment rate for Loudon County remained steady at 4.4 in January and February while in Monroe County it was 6.4 in Jaunary and fell to 6.3 in February.


"Pack the Park" Night a huge success

Cameras Ready to Roll in Tennessee

Film, Entertainment & Music Commission Launches New Incentive Program

Nashville - Tennessee's varied locations and rich entertainment heritage will now become even more attractive to creators of visual and musical content under three new incentive programs launched last week, according to the executive director of the Tennessee Film, Entertainment and Music Commission Perry Gibson.

"These three incentive programs will place Tennessee squarely among the most production-friendly locations in the U.S.," said Gibson. "Building on Tennessee-based films like 'Walk the Line,' 'Hustle and Flow' and '21 Grams," we're showing that Tennessee is a prime location for filmmakers seeking artistic and economic success.'

"Tennessee has long welcomed artists, no matter which creative medium they choose to work in," said Tennessee Governor Phil Bredesen. "Our state is a creative center for the music business and I believe this program allows us to build the same synergies in film and television entertainment as well."

The Tennessee film and television incentive program will utilize a series of tax rebates, a headquarters incentive and a grant program established by a \$10 million fund sought by Tennessee Governor Phil Bredesen last year and approved by the Tennessee General Assembly in the Visual Content Act of 2006. Under the legislation, Tennessee can support film and television

projects in the following ways:

Visual production companies headquartered outside the state filming projects in Tennessee with a budget of at least \$500,000 are eligible for rebates equal to 13 percent of the production's "below the line" costs. If at least 25 percent of the production's cast and crew are hired in Tennessee, an additional 2 percent rebate is available for a total of 15 percent. Another 2 percent rebate is available if the production also spends at least \$20,000 in post-production for the use of music created or recorded by Tennesseans, making the total rebate 17 percent.

tion companies with an in-state production budget of \$200,000 for the project.

Film production companies that establish a permanent headquarters facility in Tennessee and incur a minimum of \$1 million in qualified expenses in the state may be eligible for a 15 percent refund of the company's qualified expenses. If a production company does not have a qualifying headquarters, but spends at least \$1 million in qualified expenses, a company's investor may receive the refund as long as they have a headquarters facility in Tennessee.

The Tennessee Film, Entertainment and Music Commission is also establishing a competitive grant application system for Tennessee-based filmmakers. Filmmakers who reside in Tennessee can apply for a grant of up to \$40,000 for the development and completion of qualified film or digital productions.

Applications for each of the incentive programs must be made to the Tennessee Film, Entertainment and Music Commission. The executive director of the Commission will evaluate applications, select projects for funding and then recommend them to the Commissioner of Economic and Community Development and the Commissioner of Revenue for approval.
