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

While talking with Roberson she admitted to selling marijuana. The total amount of the marijuana was less than one ounce.



At that time Deputy Bowen searched the vehicle and found a small glass pipe used to smoke marijuana, a hypodermic needle along with a bottle of Andropen steroids with a small amount in the bottle.


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
