Rhonda Graves, who wasn't charged, she admitted to giving several of her prescribed hydrocodone pills to Jeff to sale and selling 11 hydrocodone herself.

out the Graves bedroom was metal hose clamps used to crush pills and several cut straws used to snort pills. Found in a brief case belonging to Jeff Graves was a glass pipe used to smoke cocaine base. While searching Jeff Graves garage outside officers discovered more cut straws and a box containing glass tubes used to cook cocaine into cocaine base along with another pipe used to smoke cocaine base. Rhonda Graves was not arrested at that time due to a medical condition. The Narcotics Division will be seeking indictments for her arrest at a later date.

Also during a search of the building several road signs were found that Graves had taken.

tive growth rates," Finance and Administration Commissioner Dave Goetz said. "We continue to be concerned with the vear-to-date negative growth in our tax collections, but we are completely committed to balancing the state's budget in a responsible manner during this extraordinary national economic downturn."

On an accrual basis. October is the third month in the 2008-2009 fiscal vear.

October collections were \$75.8 million less than the budgeted estimate. The general fund was under collected by \$72.0 million and the four other funds were under collected by \$3.8 million.

Sales tax collections were \$40.9 million less than the estimate for October. The October growth rate was negative 4.71 %. Year-to-date the growth rate is negative 3.14%.

Franchise and excise combined collections for October were negative \$17.9 million, and they were \$23.7 million below the budgeted estimate of \$5.8 mil-

Gasoline and motor fuel collections decreased by 16.21% and they were \$10.1

million below the budgeted estimate of \$73.9 million.

Tobacco tax collections for the month were over collected by \$400,000, and they were \$2.7 million over October 2007 collections.

Inheritance and Estate taxes were under collected by \$400,000 for the month.

All other taxes were under collected by a net \$1.1 million.

Year-to date collections for three months were \$217.7 million less than the budgeted estimate. The general fund was under collected by \$200.2 million and the four other funds were under collected

by \$17.5 million.

The budgeted revenue estimates for 2008-2009 are based on the State Funding Board's consensus recommendation adopted by the second session of the 105th General Assembly in May of 2008.
















Blitz

Beginning November 17, the Governor's Highway Safety Office is joining forces with NHTSA, and state and local highway safety and law enforcement leaders to launch a special high-visibility Click It or Ticket enforcement campaign to buckle down on all motorists not buckling up – but especially those in rural areas.

This special enforcement emphasis on rural roadways will take place in addition to Tennessee's participation in the national Click it or Ticket seat belt enforcement mobilization planned for late May next year.

"We're going to send the Click it or Ticket message out loud and clear, to all drivers and passengers, but with a special emphasis on those in rural areas." said Tennessee Department of Transportation Commissioner Gerald Nicely. "Rural areas account for a disproportionately high number of traffic deaths. While only about a quarter of the U.S. population lives in rural areas, more than half of all traffic fatalities occur in rural areas."

In Tennessee during 2007, 59 percent of the State's 1,210 traffic fatalities occurred in a rural area, compared to 41 percent in an urban area.

"It is clear we must do something to address the number of crashes in rural parts of our state," said GHSO Director Kendell Poole. "In addition, other motorists most at risk of experiencing a fatal crash are teen drivers, particularly young males, and pickup truck drivers and passengers. A common factor in each case is a lack of safety belt use."

Nearly half (270) of all passenger vehicle fatalities in rural areas involved light trucks. Among those, where restraint use was known, nearly three-fourths (74%) were unrestrained. What's more, 80% of pickup truck occupants killed in Tennessee were not restrained (where restrained use was known). This holds true in rural areas, ur-

ban areas, and overall in the state.

Poole explained that regular safety belt use is the single most effective way to protect people and reduce fatalities in motor vehicle crashes, "Seat belts clearly save lives. Sadly, too many folks in Tennessee, particularly in our rural areas, need a tough reminder. So, this November, we're committed to doing all we can to convince Tennesseans to buckle up for protection. No more warnings. No more excuses. No matter who you are or where you are on the road, don't risk it. Click It or Ticket."
