



Cumberland River commercial fishermen breaking a law designed to protect these fish, they cited both men for multiple violations.

Also referred to as "spoonbill" catfish, paddlefish are cherished by commercial fishermen because their roe is sold as caviar in a lucrative market that prizes its small dark eggs and because once mature, a paddlefish is capable of carrying at least four pounds of roe.

A paddlefish does not reach maturity until it is at least six years old, which is in part why TWRA has minimum length limits and a relatively short commercial fishing season that begins in November and ends in early April.

Among Tennessee's native species, paddlefish have struggled since the construction of dams along major rivers like the Cumberland, and because of increased commercial fishing pressure.

In recent years TWRA, along with its governing body of commissioners, has created more protection for the fish with special regulations that includes a phasing in of longer length limits.

"The two guys we arrested this past Thursday morning weren't worrying about the future of the paddlefish resource," sald Mark Forkum, one of the wildlife officers who cited the fishermen at Neely's Bend Boat Ramp in Nashville. "They were only worried about the moment and about themselves."

What wildlife officers observed were 27-year-old Brandon Russell and 70-year old Robert Gentry, both from Nashville, cutting the stomachs of numerous paddle-fish as they removed them from nets and then tossed fish back into the river when they apparently did not contain roe.

"Our regulations say that you have to check for roe with a sterile stainless steel syringe," noted Matt Brian, also one of the officers working the case. "We found a syringe in the boat and we found alcohol for sterilizing it, but we did not see them using it."

A syringe is a far less intrusive and damaging way to check for roe and is a method authorized by the TWRA. In addition, paddlefish must currently be at least 36 inches in length from the base of an eye to the fork of their tail before they can be kept.

Russell and Gentry used a knife to check for eggs, leaving a gash in the fish that a syringe would not make.

"It's not known if every fish that is cut will die," noted Doug Markham, an information officer for TWRA. "We have documented floating paddlefish with their stomachs cut."

Brandon and Gentry face penalties that could exceed \$500 for each fish plus court costs for at least seven commercial fishing violations. In addition, their aluminum boat, 60-horsepower motor, numerous nets, and other equipment are being held for evidence. They could also lose their commercial fishing license.

Nine paddlefish were also taken from the commercial fishermen and all were full of roe, a harvest that would have brought the fishermen more than \$3,000.

### E&C announces Green Development Conference

Nashville, – The Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation will host a Green Development Conference in Nashville Feb. 24-26, in partnership with the Kentucky Department for Environmental Protection and the U.S.

Environmental Protection Agency. The three-day conference, titled "Green Development: Good for Water and the Bottom Line" will be held at the Sheraton Music City Hotel.

The conference will feature expert presenters from across the country, and is designed to promote dialogue and exchange among state and local officials, developers, architects and contractors on the aspects of green development and its contribution to the ef-

ficient use and quality of state waters.

"This is a great opportunity to learn more about the benefits of green development and tools to help communities achieve sustainable growth." said Sloan. "Our goal is to foster dialogue among representatives of local governments who manage and implement stormwater programs, land-use planning, building and plumbing codes, as well as those in the design and construction industries involved in green development."

The conference is the result of a joint proposal submitted to EPA by the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation and the Kentucky Department for Environmental Protection and is largely funded by a grant from EPA's Office of Water.

Advance registration received before January 31 is \$185. Registration received February 1-21 is \$215. On-site registration will be \$250 per person. Registration fees include full access to the event, including the exhibit show, educational sessions and meals. Meals include a reception on Sunday, February 24; breakfast, lunch, and dinner on Monday, February 25; and breakfast on Tuesday, February 26; plus other refreshments.



DALLAS - Police said two burglars struck a Texas store that sells high-end security equipment, and the whole thing was caught on tape by 17 cameras rolling in the store.

"The point is, nobody is safe; there is always a stupid criminal out there," said Kris Webb, owner of Spy Supply.

The thieves broke into Webb's surveillance gear store in North Richland Hills. Texas, last week.

"I've got them on no less than 17 cameras," Webb said. "We are a security business."

And if the name of the business wasn't telling enough, multiple warning signs on the store should have given the burglars a clue that they would be on camera.

"It is absolutely astounding that these people have the audacity to steal from us and not expect to get caught," Webb said.

The surveillance cameras caught several clear images of the two men who broke in through the store's front door with a crowbar early Friday.

Police said the duo filled a trash can with close to \$10,000 worth of spy equipment.

Authorities said the video even showed a clear shot of their getaway car.

Webb said he's taking the robbery in stride.

"I'm pretty confident they will get caught," he said. "I'm not confident we'll get our equipment back."
