

TDOT Releases Historic Bridges Book

Nashville. - The Tennessee Department of Transportation has published a first-ofits-kind book, entitled Tennessee's Pre-1946 Masonry Arch, Timber Truss, Metal Truss, Concrete Arch, Metal Arch, and Suspension Bridges. This study is the culmination of research documenting the unique histories of individual bridges, bridge companies, and general bridge building techniques in Tennessee, up to the end of World War II.

"We have a number of significant historic bridges here in Tennessee," said TDOT Commissioner Gerald Nicely. "This book will appeal not only to historians and engineers, but also to anyone who has wondered about the history of a bridge in their community."

This publication details TDOT's state-wide survey of vehicular metal truss, timber truss, masonry arch, concrete arch, metal arch, and suspension bridges that have been or are currently located on highways. The book also reveals the existence of such rare structures as one of the few Baltimore Petit truss and Bowstring truss bridges remaining in the Southeast as well as possibly the only nineteenth century cable stayed suspension bridge in the United States.

The book's author. Martha Carver, has been a historian with the Tennessee Department of Transportation since 1980. In addition to her work at TDOT. Ms. Carver has written articles for various journals and magazines, and was co-editor for Looking Beyond the Highway: Dixie Roads and Culture, published by the University of Tennessee Press in 2006.

Copies of the book are being provided to libraries across the state as well as to each county mayor and road superintendent in Tennessee. Copies have also been provided to other state highway departments and state historic preservation agencies across the country. A limited number of couies are available free. on a "first come, first served" basis, through TDOT's Environmental Division.
