A certain amount of body fat serves several functions: to cushion and position your body organs, to protect your bones from injury and to form a layer under your skin. This fat layer offers insulation, helping you stay warm. And the soft fat pads on vour buttocks and the palms of your hands protect your bones from bumps, bangs and jolts.

So yes, we need fat, but in moderation. The guideline for fat intake is that we consume no more than 20 percent to 35 percent of our total calories from fat.

Sweet Potatoes Are at Their Peak

Fall and winter are the peak seasons for sweet potatoes-delicious vegetables packed with vitamins A and C, beta-carotene, folic acid and potassium.

A medium-sized sweet potato contains

3 grams of fiber and iust 160 calories, making it a good nutritional choice any time of vear.

A sweet potato has a dark, orange skin and a vivid orange, sweet inside that cooks to a moist texture. When buying fresh sweet potatoes, choose those that are small to medium in size with smooth. unbruised skins.

Sweet potatoes are best stored in a dry, dark environment at about 55 degrees Fahrenheit. They will keep for up to three to four weeks.

Enjoy a sweet potato in many of the same ways you would a reqular potato: baked; cut into strips and baked for sweet potato fries or mashed with a touch of brown sugar or freshly grated nutmeg.

Check the product's label for important in-

formation about canned goods:

* For canned fruit, look for descriptions such as "packed in its own juices," "packed in fruit juice," unsweetened," "in light syrup" or "in heavy syrup." Fruits packed in juices contain less added sugar and therefore fewer calories than fruits packed in syrup.

* If you're cutting back on sodium, look for descriptions such as "no salt added" and "reduced sodium" on Nutrition Facts labels of canned vegetables.

For maximum flavor and nutritional value from canned foods, use the product immediately after opening it. Handle leftovers as you would any perishable food: Store in the refrigerator or freezer to retain taste and nutritional quality.
