

Police arrested a Philadelphia man after finding about an ounce of marijuana in his vehicle during a traffic stop. A passenger was also was charged.

Shane Edward Crass, 31, Seed Tick Road, Philadelphia was charged Sunday with felony possession of schedule VI (marijuana).

The report states, Corporal Pete Mc-Ginley, LCSO was on routine patrol on Old 95 and while traveling behind a red Chevy Cavalier noticed the brake lights on the Cavalier were not working properly. The vehicle turned into a driveway on Happy Hollow Road and pulled up to the

carport.

Corporal McGinley also noticed the driveway the vehicle pulled into had an off duty deputy's personal vehicle in it, so he called him. The off-duty officer advised he did not recognise the vehicle in his driveway.

A short time later, Corporal McGinley stopped the Cavalier at Old 95 at Hotchkiss Valley Road and Deputy Brad Rayfield arrived on scene to assist.

Mr. Crass reportedly gave permission for a search of his vehicle and a Dale Earnhart jacket was found in the trunk. Two clear plastic baggys containing a green leafy plant like material believed to be marijuana were discovered in a pocket.

After reading Crass his rights, Crass told the lawman he purchased the marijuana that morning and paid \$100 for it. He also advised he purchased an ounce and that was the amount in the

baggys.

James Christopher Patterson, 31, Maple Hill Road, Loudon, a passenger in the car with Mr. Crass was charged with violation of probation and was also arrested.



Halloween is a particularly deadly night due to drunk drivers. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), in 2008, 58 percent of all highway fatalities across the nation on Halloween night involved a driver or motorcycle rider with a BAC of .08 or higher. Last year in Tennessee, eight people were killed in seven crashes on Halloween between 12:00 a.m., October 31, 2008, through 6:00 a.m., November 1. 2008. Four of those crashes involved alcohol. That compares to

three people killed in crashes on Halloween during the same time period in 2007. One crash in 2007 involved alcohol.

"One foolish decision can turn a fun Halloween into a real nightmare," stated THP Colonel Mike Walker. "We want everyone to have a good time, but be smart about it. Designate a driver. This is your warning, because if you drink and drive, you will go to jail."

Parents and children have a responsibility to be safe this Halloween too. The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) found that the number of deaths among young pedestrians (ages 5-14) is four times higher on Halloween evening than any other evening of the year. The U.S. Department of Transportation (US-DOT) reports that fatal collisions between motor vehicles and young pedestrians (under the age of 15) happen most frequently between 4:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m., prime trick-or-treating time. Parents should remind teens just how terrifying, dangerous and illegal it is to drink and drive. In 2008, 31% of young drivers, 15 to 20 years old, who were killed in crashes, had a BAC of .08 or higher. Drivers are less likely to use restraints when they have been drinking. In 2008, 63 per-

Tips for Motorists

Slow down. Watch for children walking on roads, medians and curbs.

Be extra alert when pulling in and out of

driveways.

Be especially alert for children darting out from between parked vehicles and from behind bushes and shrubs. They're excited - and they are not paying attention.

 Do not pass other vehicles that have stopped in the roadway. They could be dropping off children.

* If you are driving to a Halloween Party, put your mask on after you park the car.

Never drink and drive tonight or any night. If you are partying, designate a driver.

Tips for Parents

Adults should accompany children at all times and supervise their "trick or treat" activities.

Teach children to "stop, look left-rightleft, and listen" before they cross the street.

* Instruct children to stay on sidewalks and to cross only at corners or crosswalks.

Use a flashlight and wear retro-reflective strips or patches on

your clothing or costume to be more visible to motorists.

* Be certain that the mask does not obstruct vision or hearing.

* Ensure that costumes do not impede walking or driving ability. Tips for Pedestrians (children and adults)

Before crossing a street, stop at the curb or edge of the road and look left, right and left again to be sure no cars are coming. Continue to check for traffic while on the street.

* Walk - never run from house to house or across the road.

* Cross the street only at intersections and crosswalks.

 When crossing at an intersection with a traffic light, be sure to watch for turning cars. Obey all pedestrian signals.

Walk on sidewalks whenever possible. If there are no sidewalks, walk on the left side of the street facing traf-


