Robert A. Newcomb. 22. Pine Grove New Providence Road, Lenoir City was charged with violation of community corrections and theft under \$500, out of Knox County.

According to the affidavit. Robert Newcomb was convicted on May 8th, 2008, of the offenses of aggravated burglary, theft and burglary in the Criminal Court of Loudon County. The court suspended the imposition of sentence and placed Mr. Newcomb on community corrections for a term of 3 years.

Since then, Newcomb has not properly conducted himself, but has violated the conditions of his sentencing order in a material respect by his failure to report in over 30 days. failure to pay on court obligations and failure to obtain DNA.

He was found on the back steps of an apartment in McGhee Square in Lenoir City where he had been staying with a female. When officers asked for Mr. Newcomb, she stated he was not there, but had been there a couple of days prior.

Sgt. J.J. Wiggins, LCSO saw Newcomb standing outside of this apartment with the door open before Investigator Russell knocked on the door of the apartment. Mr. Newcomb reportedly tried to leave the apartment, but was stopped by Sgt. Wiggins. No other information was available at the time of





vest are at least 2 1/2 years of age or older," said Daryl Ratajcak, TWRA Big Game Coordinator. "That is proof positive the age structure in the Tennessee deer herd is extremely healthy."

Tennessee deer hunters are finding a big change to their 2009-10 seasons. A continuous 14-day muzzleloader season began Nov. 7 and continues to the opening day of gun season. Unit B hunters have the biggest increase in hunting opportunities as they will now follow the

same season dates as Units A and L. The change means that East Tennessee hunters will have no more closed days during the middle of deer season.

No more than one antlered buck may be taken per day. The statewide bag limit for antlered bucks is three as the two-buck restriction in Unit B has been eliminated. An antlered buck is a buck with an antler measuring at least three inches long.

For antierless deer hunting in Units A and B during this season, refer to the list of hunts on page 23 of the hunting guide. There are quota and non-quota hunts listed on that page with bag limits for each. For antlerless deer hunting in Units A and B during this season, refer to the list of hunts on page 23 of the 2009 Tennessee Hunting and Trapping Guide. There are quota and non-quota hunts listed on that page. The bag limit for antlerless deer in Unit L is three per day.

Án Annual Sportsman, Lifetime Sportsman, Type 167 Permit, or Type 94 permit is required to harvest antlerless deer during this season on all non-quota hunts in Units A, B, and L.

TWRA personnel will be collecting data at various check-in stations across the state on Saturday. Antlered bucks will be measured and aged for management purposes.

after January 1, 1969 is required to carry proof of satisfactory completion of a hunter education class or be in possession of the Apprentice Hunting License (along with other required licenses) while hunting any species in Tennessee.
