
Drug runner nabbed after tailgating big rig

A Cosby man reportedly carrying drugs for resale d numerous pills was taken into custody after his vehicle as stopped for tailgating other traffic on I-75.

Damon Allen Brewer, 40, Peaceful Retreat Way, Cosby was charged with possession of schedule VI (marijuana) for resale, possession of schedule II (oxycontin), possession of schedule III (suboxone) and possession of schedule IV (xanax).


Do you have to be 21 to steal from the liquor store?

County non-seasonally adjusted unemployment rates for October 2009, released today, show that the rate increased in 38 counties, decreased in 42, and remained the same in 15 counties.

Lincoln County registered the state's lowest

county unemployment rate at 6.9 percent, unchanged from its September rate. Lauderdale County had the state's highest unemployment rate at 18.9 percent, up 0.1 from the September rate, followed by Hancock County at 18.0 percent, down from 18.4 percent in September.

Knox County had

the state's lowest major metropolitan rate of 7.8 percent, down 0.3 percentage point from the September rate. Hamilton County was at 8.8 percent, up 0.1 percentage point

from the September rate. Davidson County was 8.9 percent, down 0.2 from the previous month, and Shelby County was 10.2 percent, up 0.1 from the September rate.







While talking to Mr. Brewer and letting him know the K9 indicted on his vehicle, Mr. Brewer advised he had smoked pot several times in the vehicle. During the search, Agent Wil-

son found a purple cloth bag containing three bags of suspected marijuana, six oxycontin 30mg, three suboxone, two xanax, ten cut straws and rolling papers under the engine hood, on top of the battery box.

Brewer was placed under arrest and transported to jail.

Ronnie L. Cantrell, 50, Barbourville, Kentucky was charged with driving under the influence.

The report states, Deputy Charles Butler, LCSO was dispatched to the area of Interstate 75 northbound around the 76 mm in reference to a black Trailblazer with Georgia tags driving all over the roadway. The officer spotted the vehicle around the 79 mm and watched it cross the center line then cross over to the shoulder of the highway several times.

Deputy Butler acti-

vated his blue lights and stopped the vehicle at the 79 mm. Mr. Cantrell reportedly had a hard time speaking and staying awake. He had red glassy eyes and was very slow in his reaction time.

Mr. Cantrell performed poorly on field sobriety tasks.

The officer asked him if he was taking medication and Cantrell reportedly said yes, oxycodone and xanax. Cantrell was read and explained the Tennessee implied consent and agreed to submit a blood sample.
