The application will be available on the Tennessee Department of Labor's Internet site beginning today and the first benefit payments are expected to be mailed December 18, 2009.

Here's the latest on the U.S. 64 rockslide: Crews continued drilling the unstable rock face on the west side of the main slide area as they prepare for a series of trim blasts that began Thursday morning. The 100+ individual holes drilled over the course of the last week will be loaded with explosive. Charges will be detonated incrementally in order to remove small sections at a time and minimize seismic activity at Dam No. 2 which is currently overtop-

ued scaling operations on the upper east side of the slide mass to remove loose boulders and debris and make it safe for drilling operations to take place as work progresses to the east.

The contractor plans to begin removing debris from the roadway surface beginning today and will work from the west to the east in order to allow the 275 ton crawler crane to continue eastward with drilling and trim blasting operations. The debris and boulders will be broken up into manageable sizes using a ram-hoe and

then will be loaded onto dump trucks and hauled from the site. It is expected that it will take approximately 3000 to 4000 dump truck loads to completely remove the slide debris from the site.

A Loudon woman received her third DUI after police saw her drive in an oncoming turn lane the wrong way and stopped her vehicle.

Tammy Marcella Bradshaw, 46, Webster Court, Loudon was charged with DUI 3rd offense.

According to records, on Saturday around 12:33 AM, Sgt. R.S. Newman, LPD noticed a green Dodge pickup turn left off Highway 11 onto Highway 72.

The vehicle reportedly turned into the wrong lane and traveled through the oncoming turn lane. The truck then made a right

turn onto Maremont Parkway as the officer activated his blue lights.

Ms. Bradshaw reportedly had slurred speech and appeared to be under the influence of some type of narcotic. She was given sobriety tasks in which she failed.

Ms. Bradshaw was read the implied consent form and consented to a blood screen at

the Fort Loudoun ER. A check through NCIC showed her to have two prior convictions for DUI.

An investigation led by Loudon County Sheriff's Office Detective Charles Cosner into the late November burglary of a pickup truck resulted in the arrest of a Loudon man Thursday who also had assault warrants issued against him just the day before his arrest.

According to records, Detective Cosner charged Fredrick David Hall, 37, Sunshine Private Lane, Loudon with auto burglary and theft under \$500.

An affidavit states on or about November 29th, 2009, Mr. Fredrick David Hall did enter into a truck belonging to a man located at a residence on Sunshine Private Lane in Loudon without the owner's effective consent. While in the truck, Mr. Hall did take a .22 caliber Taurus revolver valued at \$350 with the intent to deprive the owner of the property.

During the investigation, Mr. Hall did admit to these circumstances. He was taken into custody by Detective Cosner at 5:10 PM Thursday at the Loudon County Sheriff's Office.

A short time later, around 5:46 PM, Deputy Bobby Hamilton, LCSO charged Hall with two counts of aggravated assault x 2.

According to those records, just a day prior

to Hall's arrest for the burglary, Deputy Hamilton had responded to a residence on Sunshine Private Lane to take a report of a domestic assault.

Upon arrival no one would answer the door at the victim's house. The deputy went into the home and could not locate the victim or the assailant. He also reported finding two guns inside the residence, a 12 gauge shotgun and a Mauser rifle.

Records indicate the officer located the victim at a neighbor's house. She stated Hall had come to her house at 3:00 AM and was beating on the door. She didn't answer the door and he left. He then came back at 6:00 AM and began to beat on the door again and was screaming at her.

According to the victim, Hall forced the door open and came in with the Mauser rifle in hand. He pointed the gun at her and told her he could blow her brains out anytime.

An 11 year old on at the location tried

to run for help, but Hall grabbed him and pushed him down. The woman said when tried to protect the boy, Hall grabbed her by her hair and began to throw her around. Then he threw her on the floor and started to kick and stomp her.

The victim further advised when Hall stopped the assault she told him she had to take kids to school and he told her she better come back or there would be severe consequences for her if she did not return.

The woman left and went to neighbor's where she called 911. Warrants were issued.

"During this slow economic period, we have seen an unprecedented number of Tennesseans staying on unemployment until they exhaust their benefits," said Neeley. "This will give those who are still looking for work more time to cover their expenses through the holidays and into 2010."

This federally funded extension is the fourth announcement of benefits beyond the initial 26 weeks of unemployment compensation provided by the state. While the intent of the bill was to add 20 weeks of payments, an oversight in the way the federal law was structured prevented individuals from receiving the maximum weeks of entitlement. Depending on an individual's initial claim eligibility, wage history and subsequent employment status, the maximum entitlement for the latest extension of unemployment benefits is 14 weeks.
