12-day season which ran from Dec. 7-18.

The impact of the shift from a split season to the consolidated season was expected to have little effect on the number of turkeys that were harvested.

"The 2009 fall harvest of 1,931 turkeys was right at the long-term average" said Gray Anderson, TWRA's wild turkey program coordinator.

Statewide, there were 1,217 hunters that reported harvested birds for an average of 1.6 birds per hunter. About 73 percent of hunters harvested a single turkey and only 2 percent of hunters took over five birds. Maury (142), Smith (105), Giles (102), Rutherford (91) and Lincoln (82) counties were

the top five harvest counties.

"Our fall turkey season does a great job of focusing harvest pressure exactly where our regional biologists have identified a management need," said Anderson

Applications for the 2010 Spring Turkey Quota Hunts are currently being accepted until Feb. 10, 2010. Interested hunters may apply at any TWRA license agent, TWRA regional office, or online at the TWRA Web site.

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Rockslide

of the main slide area continued drilling the slope face in preparation of trim blasting operations. Crews also completed the construction of the 12' high, 100' long protective rockfall fence positioned above TVA Dam No. 2. Crews also completed the drilling, installation grouting of the projects first test bolt that will determine the design criteria for the bolting locations, tension, and numbers for both the east and west side of the slope face. The rock bolts are used to help anchor two or more layers of rock along a slope that may otherwise be susceptible to a slide. Blasting personnel were mobilized Monday to conduct a trim blast on the western side of the main slide area.

The contractor plans to continue his operation of working from the west to the east with trim blasting, rock bolting, and cleanup of the slide debris in the roadway. This is expected to continue through the first week of January when it is expected that the contractor will begin blasting the eastern side of the slide area as part of the overall remediation process.

According to managers, McCown had paid for only one of the Red Bulls. The value of the items was \$10.74.

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




















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investigations during 2009—from art crime to weapons of mass destruction violations. As the year comes to a close, we thought you'd be interested in a rundown of some of our most significant cases—in terms of their impact on your communities and the overall security of our nation.

To focus on our top investigative priority: protecting the nation from terrorist attack. The threat posed by extremists is real—and it continues to morph and evolve in new and dangerous

ways. We had our hands full during the year, from heading off potential plots on U.S. soil to identifying Americans being recruited to wage jihad overseas.

Here are some of the top terror cases of 2009:

Jihadists of Georgia: With little more than an Internet connection and the radicalizing influences of overseas terrorists, two middle-class young men in Atlanta went from rhetoric to plotting jihad.

David Coleman Headley: The U.S. citizen was arrested in October for planning terrorist attacks against a Danish newspaper and two of its employees. New charges this month allege he took part in the conspiracy surrounding the 2008 Mumbai attacks.

Somalia: In February, we reported that young men from Minneapolis were traveling to Somalia to join extremists fighting for control of the country. One of those men became who we believe was the first U.S. citizen to carry out a terrorist suicide bombing after launching an attack in Somalia. By November, 14 defendants were charged with recruiting people from the U.S. to train or fight on behalf of extremist groups in Somalia.

Najibullah Zazi: The 24-year-old Colora-do resident was arrested in September, along with his father and another man, for conspiracy to use weapons of mass de-

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struction against U.S. citizens. Zazi traveled to New York City on September 10, 2009 "in furtherance of his criminal plans," according to the Department of Justice.

Attempted bombing of federal building: In September, a U.S. citizen was arrested in connection with a plot to detonate a vehicle bomb at the federal building in Springfield, Illinois.

Attempted skyscraper bombing: Also in September, a 19-year-old Jordanian citizen who espoused violent jihad was arrested for attempting to blow up a 60-story glass office tower in Dallas, Texas.

North Carolina takedown: Seven men, including a father and two sons, were charged with conspiring to provide material support to terrorists and to wage jihad overseas. The heavily armed group trained in the U.S., raised money to support their training, and recruited and radicalized others.

Synagogue plot: In May, four people were arrested outside a New York synagogue and charged with planning to blow up Jewish targets and shoot down military planes.

Liberty City Six: In May, a Miami jury convicted five men of providing material support to al Qaeda and planning attacks on U.S. targets, including the Sears Tower in Chicago.

Ali al-Marri: In May, the al Qaeda "sleeper" operative working in the U.S. pled guilty to charges relating to his role in the 9/11 attacks.
