Nashville, - The Kingston Steam Plant fly ash spill will be the topic at the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency's next Nature @ Noontime program on Thursday, April 2 from 12-1 p.m. Hosted by TWRA's Information & Education Division, the program is held the first Thursday of each month with the exception of July.

David McKinney, Chief of TWRA's Environmental Services Division will be the program's April presenter and will give an overview of the spill and explain what

On Dec. 22, 2008, the walls gave way on a massive, aboveground coal ash landfill spilling coal ash sludge over more than 300 acres near Kingston. The nearly five and a half million tons of sludge spread across the community, knocked one home off its foundation and damaged others. The sludge toppled trees and filled wetlands and two embayments of the Emory River, This event raised health and environmental concerns in nearby neighborhoods and miles downstream and launched a cleanup that could cost \$825 million.

TWRA was one of the first on the scene. knowing that wildlife, especially aquatic species, could be adversely affected by the spill both at the site and downstream on the Emory and Clinch Rivers.

Fly ash, a byproduct of burning coal, contains trace amounts of arsenic, lead, mercury, beryllium and other potentially toxic substances. The Kingston Power Plant, a coal-fired electric generation station initially developed during World War II. largely to power the uranium enrichment clants used to make

the world's first atomic bomb at nearby Oak Ridge National Laboratory, has been accumulating fly ash for years.

Among TWRA's Environmental Services Division's responsibilities are surveying and documenting fish kills and contaminant monitoring for mussels. Assessment of the impact of this fly ash release on wildlife resources and habitat will require repeated sampling and evaluation over the next three to five years and perhaps even longer. TWRA will be coordinating with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) and other resource agencies in this process.

The Nature @ Noontime presentations are about natural resource related topics and last about 30-45 minutes, allowing time for discussion during the allotted lunch hour. Corporal P. McGinley, LCSO made the arrest.

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

Watson allegedly spoke with slurred speech and she was very unsteady on her feet. She performed poorly on all field sobriety tasks.

Watson reportedly advised the officer she was not in possession of any narcotics when she was placed under arrest for public intoxication.

Once at the jail,

Deputy Olwin Norman, LCSO performed a pat down search of Mrs. Watson and found a tall prescription bottle inside of her shirt. There was no label on the bottle. Inside was a small clear plastic baggy containing 16 small round light blue pills identified as Roxicodone, a schedule II narcotic.

Also in the bottle were 20 oblong blue pills identified as Xanax, a schedule IV narcotic. Mrs.Watson did not possess a written prescription for the narcotics she possessed. As a result of bringing the narcotics into a correctional facility she was also charged with introduction of controlled substance into a penal facility.

Christopher Watson was charged af-

ter Assistant Chief Davis came in contact with him in the lobby and found he, too had slurred speech and was unsteady on his feet.

Christopher Watson performed poorly on all field sobriety tasks and advised he had taken two 1 mg. Xanax and two doses of Methadone.

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

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

Charles Sherman Thaxton, 21, of Riverview Road, Lenoir City was charged with driving on revoked.


According to the report, Officer Jason Felts, LCPD observed a silver vehicle with a broken taillight and stopped it.
