

### Cocaine

tor A.J. Yokely, conducted a traffic stop on a blue GMC SUV at the intersection of McGhee Boulevard and Kelly Lane. The driver, Ms. Deanna L. Cozart was taken into custody on the indictment.

A passenger in the vehicle, Dequan Cerale Twilley, 22, Lower Holsmill Road, Shelbyville was charged with possession of cocaine.

According to the report, while taking Cozart into custody, Sgt. Hall detected a strong odor of marijuana emitting from the vehicle. After removing the passengers and placing them in front of the vehicle, the Sgt. observed one of the passengers, later identified as Dequan C. Twilley, reach into his shorts.

The officer performed a pat down of Twilley for Twilley's safety as well as his own. K9 Draga was deployed around the vehicle while other officers checked warrants on all involved. K9 Draga alerted in the area of the front of the truck where Twilley was standing and then alerted to a plastic bag on the ground where Twilley was standing. The bag contained a white powder substance that later field tested positive as cocaine.

K9 Draga also alert-

K9 Draga also alerted in the area of the driver's door lower seam. A search of the vehicle produced several marijuana seeds.

While reviewing the video of the stop, Twilley was observed reaching into his shorts and dropping something on the ground where the plastic bag containing the cocaine was found. The weight of the cocaine was less then 1 gram.

The event took place within Lenoir City Elementary School's school zone.

day, September 8. This will provide maximum roadway capacity for motorists traveling during the busy Labor Day holiday.

"The Labor Day holiday is one of the busiest travel periods of the year," said TDOT Commissioner Gerald Nicely. "As thousands of people hit the road in Tennessee, we want to ensure they get to their destinations quickly and safely without road construction delays."

While lane closure activity will be stopped. workers will still be on site in many construction zones. Drivers should obey all posted speed limits. particularly in construction areas. Slower speeds are necessary in work zones due to the temporary layout of the roadway and will be enforced. Drivers convicted of speeding through work zones where workers are present face a fine of \$250 to \$500, plus court fees and possible increased insurance premiums.

"During this Labor Day weekend, travelers will notice an increased number of law enforcement personnel on Tennessee's roadways," said Governor's Highway Safety Office Director Kendell Poole. "Our main goal is for everyone to have a safe holiday, so we want to emphasize the importance of buckling up, obeying traffic laws, paying attention, and, above all, never driving drunk or impaired."

The summer travel

season is expected to close with fewer travelers during the Labor Day weekend than during the same period in 2008. AAA Auto Club South projects 567,000 Tennesseans will travel this Labor Day holiday. with 482,000 traveling by car and 11,000 traveling by air. Nationwide travel is expected to be down 13% compared to 2008. Tennessee, Georgia and Florida are anticipated to experience a 22% decline in travel compared to last year's numbers.



#### Season

Tennessee's 2009 season will again be divided into three segments: Sept. 1 through Sept. 26; Oct. 10 through Oct. 25; and Dec. 19 through Jan. 15. Hunting times, other

than the noon start on opening day, are one-half hour before sunrise until sunset for all other days.

Doves are found throughout the various regions in the state, but the most concentration is in farming areas. The hunter must have on his/her person a valid state hunting license and Tennessee Migratory Bird Permit at all times while hunting. Hunters must have landowner's permission to hunt on private land.

The daily bag limit is 15. There is no limit on collared dove. Doves not readily identifiable as collared doves will be considered mourning doves and will count toward the mourning dove daily bag limit. No person shall take migratory game birds by the aid of baiting, or on or over any baited area. Any auto-loading or repeating shotgun must be incapable of holding more than three shells while dove hunting.



bottle that originally contained over 100 prescription pain killers.

Leona Mable Turner, 29, Robinson Drive, Loudon, was charged with driving under the influence Friday, August 28, 2009.

According to the affidavit, on Wednesday August 26, 2009, Deputy Deland, LCSO was dispatched to Alien Shore Drive on a call of a power pole that fell onto a vehicle and the person being trapped in the car. Upon arrival, the deputy made contact with a black GMC Yukon.

The driver, Leona Turner was sitting in the passenger seat with the door open. The way the vehicle was positioned, this was the only way she could get out of the

vehicle.

The officer asked Turner if she was all right and she stated yes. Mrs. Turner had slurred speech, her eyes were dilated and her physical ability was slow.

Deputy Deland asked Turner if she was taking any medication. Turner said no, however she did advise she injured her ankle a couple days ago and was on her way to see her doctor, She didn't remember wrecking.

Medics responded to the call and the deputy asked Turner again if she was on any medicine. Turner stated she was taking oxycodone for the pain in her ankle. She stated she took the medication around earlier in the day.

Mrs. Turner was transported to Fort Sanders Loudoun to be treated. Deputy Deland could not administer standard field sobriety task due to Turner's physical condition and due to her impairment.

While inventorying Turner's property inside the vehicle, the lawman reported he saw a bottle of 30 mg oxycodone in her purse. The bottle was filled two days earlier on August 24, 2009 with a quantity of 140 pills, but there were only 11 pills left in the bottle.

Deputy Deland went

to the ER and read Mrs. Turner the implied consent advisement and she agreed to give blood to determine her BAC.

Deputy Michael Wilson, LCSO, arrested Turner at the Loudon County Jail.
