Monday at approximately 8:20am, Deputy Chad Petty, LCSO was dispatched to a residence on Trigonia Road to a domestic disturbance call. The victim stated from Sunday to Monday she and Yount were arguing.

The woman advised she came into the bedroom to talk to Yount and he picked up a bayonet and pointed it at her, stating he would kill her and her family.

Mr. Yount report-

edly told the officer he did point the bayonet at the female.

The victim further stated she was in fear of her life and the life of her family.

Once at the jail. Yount was searched and a round green pill believed to be klonopin was found in his front shorts pocket. Deputy Chad Petty, LCSO, made the arrest.

We are a neutral and child focused organization providing a non-threatening environment, for children ages 3-17, where the investigation, intervention and treatment of physical and sexual child abuse takes place. The beauty of a Child Advocacy Center is that the experts are under one roof so that the child will not have to re-live the traumatic experience agency by agency. We bring the investigating officers, Department of Children's Services caseworkers and the district Attorney's Office to our Center so that they are a part of the service delivery in real time. If a forensic medical examination is necessary (performed by a volunteer oncall doctor and nurse trained in working with abused children) we

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try to schedule it for the same day.

The non-offending caregivers receive services as the child is being interviewed and the Center's therapist makes introductions as well. The children and their non offending caregivers are the staff's priority and deserve the best treatment possible.

Our services include: support groups and education classes to non-offending caregivers, pregnant teens and adult survivors of child abuse. We deliver a school based curriculum, Stop Child Abuse and Neglect (SCAN) to the schools within the four counties we serve (Loudon, Morgan, Meigs and Roane) and also supply resource materials to each school. We provide an annual district-wide training to our Child Protective Investigative Team (CPIT) as they work together to investigate, serve, and prosecute offenders. Each year we sponsor a small group of CPIT members to attend the National Symposium on Child Abuse in Huntsville, Alabama.

All of our services are free of charge and have been made possible in part by grants but mostly due to donations from individuals, civic groups and businesses. We are grateful for the opportunity we have been given by the counties we serve to take care of the children whose voices have been hushed by pain and secrets. We are grateful for a beautiful new facility (built with money raised from fundraising events) in which we can best serve our children and one that offers each child comfort, peace

and safety.

Child Advocacy Centers make a difference. Studies show that communities with CAC's have many advantages. A CAC can save an average of \$1,000 per child in investigative costs. Children interviewed at CAC's are less likely to be afraid and parents/ caregivers of children treated at a CAC are more satisfied with the investigative process. Interagency coordination is more effective between law enforcement and District Attorney's offices, and results in more positive criminal justice outcomes.

According to reports, Officer Jim Thearp, LPD saw a vehicle leaving Mc-Donalds on Highway 72 and noticed the headlight was out on the drivers side. He stopped the vehicle on Highway 72 at Interstate 75 south bound ramp as it attempted to turn.

Officer Thearp asked the driver for her drivers license and she advised they were revoked. A check through NCIC found them to indeed be revoked.

Ms. Cox was reportedly very unsteady on her feet during questioning and when asked if she had been drinking she

said no, but she had taken her prescription medicine, which was Opana ER 40 mg.

Cox agreed to show the officer her prescription.

Ms. Cox said she got the prescription filled around 1:00 pm and stated she had taken approximately eight since she had them filled. It was approximately 8:30pm at the time of the traffic stop.

Upon checking

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the prescription, the officer found there were fifty-six pills prescribed and there was only twenty-seven left in the bottle. The prescription said to take only two pills a day.

Cox performed poorly on field sobriety tasks and was placed under arrest.
